General Notes: Biography: The Norton's of South Carolina originally lived near Gillisonville then moved to Robertville in Jasper County. The story is told that during the Civil War Alexander Calhoun was a spy for the confederacy. On one of his missions to Virginia, dressed in a Union uniform, he came to a farm and began asking directions about the Union Army. Mary was living on that farm with her grandparents. (She was raised by Annie Edmunds) Mary and Alexander exchanged gifts and he promised to return after the war.

Alexander was once captured by the Union Army and sentenced to die but his guard fell asleep and Alexander killed him, took his gun, slit the tent open and escaped.

Mary and Alexander lived on a farm near Eloree, South Carolina until about 1884. There is a story about their son Richard was the cause of their leaving their farm.

Henrietta Garvin says he lived in Eloree and in Holly Hills, South Carolina.

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According to Peggy Bashlor Baker, Ray Norton told her this story of how the family moved to Georgia. "Richard liked to gamble and often did with the hands that lived and worked on the farm where they had

a lumber and turpentine business. On this particular night he went down to the shack where the hands slept and got into a card game. It wasn't long before one of the men accused him of cheating, (which could have been true). There ensued a terrible fight. One man ran for Richard's father, and he came back with a gun. By the time they got there Richard was being beaten within an inch of his life. Alexander shot and killed one of the men. The other one escaped and disappeared. Alexander and his son, Richard, were put in jail for murder and kept there 18 months before the trial came up. When it did they were convicted but managed to get a new trial. In the mean time they advertised in the newspapers all over the United States for the other man to return and give his testimony to clear them. The man did return from somewhere in Texas and his testimony freed both Richard and Alexander. However, because the time away from the farm and the expenses were so great, they lost their land and home and had to move to a smaller farm (about 15 acres) in Tusculum, Ga. "

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#### Summary:

In the April Term of 1888, the South Carolina Supreme Court heard the appeal of State v. Norton. At McNeill's in Orangeburg County, South Carolina on June 23, 1887, Alexander Richard Norton shot J Lafayette Hamlin in the right side of the neck with a pistol and Alexander Calhoun Norton stabbed Hamlin in the right side of the neck with a knife. Hamlin died instantly.

Mr Wilson witnessed the entire event and gave testimony for the prosecution.

In the original trial AC and AR Norton were sentenced to death.

The original trial was September 1887 before judge J. Aldrich in Orangeburg, South Carolina.

The Supreme Court ruled on four points.

- 1. The charges should have been limited to one and not to both AC and AR having committed the murder. The Supreme court ruled that there is precedence that under certain conditions, it is permissible to have multiple charges. No error on the part of the original judge since it is one offense and two distinct counts.
- 2. The charge was obnoxious to art. IV., section 26 of the Constitution. The supreme court ruled against this claim.
- 3. The supreme court ruled in favor of the appeal that the judge in the original case should not have told the jury that the defendents had a right to "stop a witness and correct him upon a false statement."
- 4. The supreme court ruled in favor of the appeal that the judge should not have told the jury that "I do not see any room for a verdict of manslaughter."

The supreme court ruled that the case be remanded for a new trial.

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#### STATE v. NORTON

- 1. Deceased was shot while in an altercation with A, and thereupon B came up and stabbed deceased. In an indictment against A and B for the murder of deceased, there is no objection to a joinder of counts-one charge that A committed the murder with a pistol and that B was present and assisting, and the other that B committed the murder with a knife, and that A was present and assisting.
- 2. The trial judge having intimated to the jury his opinion that a witness for the prosecution was more reliable than others for the defence, and that the plea of self defence was improbable, a new trial was

granted.

- 3. It was error, under the facts of this case, to charge the jury that there was no room here for a verdict of manslaughter.
- 4. In stating to the jury that the witnesses are examined in the presence of the prisoner in order that he may stop and correct them upon a false statement, the trial judge committed an error which may have prejudiced the prisoner's case before the jury.

Before ALDRICH, J., Orangeburg, September, 1887.

Alexander C. Norton (father) and A. Richard Norton (son) were indicted for the murder of one Hamlin. During an altercation of words between Hamlin and A. R. Norton in a room, Norton fired at Hamlin, the ball taking effect in Hamlin's neck. A. C. Norton then came in while some scuffling was going on, and at once commenced to cut Hamlin with a knife.

So much of the judge's charge as bears upon the matters considered by the court, is stated in the opinion, except his remarks upon the question of conspiracy, which were as follows:

If you conclude, gentlemen, that the prisoners at the bar were acting in concert, that is, that they had conspired together to make an attack upon the deceased, either with a deadly weapon or otherwise, if you know that such a conspiracy existed, you need not inquire at all which wound was the mortal wound. If there was a conspiracy between the father and the son to inflict great bodily harm upon the deceased, then there is no necessity for you to consider which wound killed him, because both are principals in that case. A conspiracy may be formed at the very time that the rencounter takes place. But if there is a conspiracy existing previous to the fight, or to the rencounter in which death follows, then both are principals, and no matter who inflicts the mortal wound both are guilty, if the attack was made with malice aforethought. You need not, therefore, inquire into the subject of which wound killed him, provided you are satisfied that the deceased came to his death from wounds inflicted by weapons in the hands of one or both of the conspirators.

Defendants appealed upon the following exceptions, inter alia:

I. Because the court erred in refusing the motion of the defendants asking that the solicitor be required to elect upon which of the two counts set forth in the indictment he would proceed.

Opinion of the Court. [28 S. C. REP.] April Term, 1888.

II. Because the charge of his honor, the presiding judge, was in violation of art. IV., sec. 24, of the Constitution, in that it charged upon the facts.

V. Because his honor erred in charging the jury that the prisoner had a right to "stop a witness and correct him upon a false statement,"

XV. Because his honor erred in charging the jury as follows: "I do not see any room here for a verdict of manslaughter."

June 14, 1888. The opinion of the court was delivered by MR. CHIEF JUSTICE SIMPSON. The defendants, appellants, were convicted of murder in the Court of General Sessions for Orangeburg County, September term, 1887, upon the following indictment, to wit:

"The Suite of South Carolina, Orangeburg County, in the General Sessions/ AT a Court of General Sessions, begun and holden in and for the County of Orangeburg, in the State of South Carolina, at Orangeburg, in the county and State aforesaid, on the third Monday of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, the jurors of and for the county aforesaid, in the State aforesaid, upon their oath, present that Alexander C. Norton and A. Richard Norton, late of the County of Orangeburg, on the twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, with force and arms, at McNeill's, in the County of Orangeburg, and State aforesaid, in and upon one J. Lafayette

Hamlin, in the peace of God, and of the said State, then and there being, feloniously, wilfully, and of their malice aforethought, did make an assault; and that the said A. Richard Norton, a a certain pistol of the value of one dollar, then and there charged with gunpowder, and one leaden bullet, which said pistol, he, the said A. Richard Norton, in his right hand, then and there had held, then and there feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, did discharge and shoot off, to, at, against, and upon the said J. Lafayette Hamlin; and that the said A. Richard Norton, with the leaden bullet aforesaid, out of the pistol aforesaid, then and there by force of the gunpowder aforesaid, by the said A. Richard Norton discharged and shot off, as aforesaid, then and there feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, did strike, penetrate, and wound, him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, in and upon the right side of the neck of him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, giving unto him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there, with the leaden bullet aforesaid, so as aforesaid discharged and shot out of the pistol aforesaid by the said A. Richard Norton in and upon the right side of the neck of him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, one mortal wound of the depth of five inches, and of the breadth of one-fourth of an inch, of which mortal wound he, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there instantly died; and that the said Alexander C. Norton then and there feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, was present, aiding, abetting, counselling, advising and assisting him, the said A. Richard Norton, the felony and murder aforesaid, in manner and form aforesaid, to do and commit. And so the jurors aforesaid, upon their oath aforesaid, do say that the said Alexander C. Norton and the aforesaid A. Richard Norton, him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there, in the manner and by the means aforesaid, feloniously, wilfully, and of their malice aforethought, did kill and murder, against the form of the statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the same State aforesaid.

And the jurors aforesaid, upon their oath aforesaid, do further present, that the said Alexander C. Norton and A. Richard Norton, on the twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, with force and arms, at McNeill's, in the County of Orangeburg, and State aforesaid, in und upon one J. Lafayette Hamlin, in The peace of God and of the said State, then and there being, feloniously, wilfully, and of their malice aforethought, did make an assault, and that the said Alexander C. Norton, with a certain knife, of the value of one dollar, which he, the said Alexander C. Norton, in his right hand, then and there had and held, him. the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, in and upon the right side of the neck of him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, did strike, penetrate, and wound, giving unto the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there with the knife aforesaid, by the stroke aforesaid, in manner aforesaid, in and upon the right side of the neck of him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, one mortal wound, of the length of five inches, and of the depth of three inches, of which said mortal wound the said J. Lafayette Hamlin then and there instantly died; and that the said A. Richard Norton then and there feloniously, wilfully, and of his malice aforethought, was present, aiding abetting, counselling, advising, and assisting the said Alexander C. Norton, the felony and murder aforesaid, in manner and form aforesaid, to do and commit. And so the jurors aforesaid upon their oath aforesaid, say: That the said Alexander C. Norton and the said A. Richard Norton, him, the said J. Lafayette Hamlin, then and there, in the manner and by the meant aforesaid, feloniously, wilfully, and of their malice aforethought, did kill and murder, against the form of the statute in such case made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the State aforesaid."

They were sentenced to death, and from this judgment they have appealed upon numerous exceptions. These exceptions, however have been condensed in the argument of appellants' counsel, mainly, into four allegations of error. And we have considered the case principally with reference to these allegations.

The first is that his honor erred in refusing appellants' motion below "to require the State to elect upon which of the two counts in the indictment it would proceed to trial." We think this exception is untenable. Where the indictment contains two or more counts, charging distinct offences, committed at different times, or by different parties, it would be objectionable, and the trial judge, in the exercise of proper discretion in such case, should require the prosecuting officer to elect one of the charges and confine himself to it, for the reason, as was said by Inglis, J., in the case of The State v. Nelson, 14 Rich., 172: "That by the multiplication of distinct charges the prisoner may be confounded in his defence, or prejudiced in his challenges, or the attention of the jury may be distracted." See, also. Arch. Cr. Pr. & Pl., \*95. Or, as was said by this court, Mr. Justice McIver speaking for the court, in the case of The State v. Scott, 15 S. C., 436: "If, however, distinct felonies are charged in separate counts not growing out of the same transaction, then the proper practice is to require the prosecuting officer to select one of the felonies and confine himself to it, even though no motion to that effect should be made by the accused."

But where the offences charged all grow out of the same transaction, and against the same parties, or

where the same offence is charged in different ways, in as many different counts, as may be thought necessary, there is no valid objection to such joinder.

See the case of State v. Scott, supra, and the cases there cited. See, also. Archbold's Criminal Practice & Pleadings, page \*96, where he says: "There is no objection to stating the same offence in different ways, in as many different counts of the indictment, as you may think necessary." Mr. Wharton says: "It is sufficient here to repeat that counts varying the statement of the mode of death are constantly sustained. And that in an indictment charging in one count A as principal, and B as accessory before the fact, and in another count B as principal and A as accessory before the fact, charges but one offence, such counts are not repugnant." Archbold on Homicide (2nd ed.), section 857.

In the case before the court, we see but one offence charged, to wit, the murder of the deceased, presented, it is true, in two distinct counts, and charged as having been committed in different ways, but still embracing the same transaction, and against the same parties. We think the indictment is sustained by the authorities cited, as well as by the reasons upon which they are based.

The next point raised by the appellants' counsel is, that the charge was obnoxious to art. IV., section 26, of the Constitution in various particulars, and especially in what his honor said in reference to the testimony of the witness, Wilson; and also that he charged, that he saw "no room for a verdict of manslaughter." We have held in several cases that a violation of the constitutional provision referred to above consists in the trial judge allowing his opinion as to a disputed fact, or the force and effect of testimony, reaching the jury, directly or indirectly, intentionally or inadvertently. Acker v. Anderson, 20 S. C., 499; Lynn v. Thornton, 17 Id., 129; State v. White, 15 Id., 392; Howard v. Wofford, 16 Id., 148. Whether this constitutional inhibition is a wise one or not, is not for us to say, nor have we ever stopped to consider that question. It is in the organic law of the State, and when invoked, we have no alternative but to consider it, and to enforce it, when the facts so demand. We have no idea that any Circuit Judge now on the bench has ever intentionally disregarded this inhibition, or wilfully set it aside. But we are not surprised that some times, in an impromptu charge, and in the warmth of an oral discussion of the various questions involved, with a statement of the testimony introduced, applicable to those questions, that the limit should be transcended in some particulars. On the contrary, the surprise is that it is not more frequently, and yet unconsciously, done.

We think in this case that the jury could hardly have failed to reach the conclusion that his honor believed that Wilson's testimony was truthful, that it was the most reliable, and should control. See Thomp. Charg. Jur., page 111, et seq. He said: "Mr. Wilson was the only witness to the whole transaction. He describes it very graphically, and it is for you to say whether his description is a truthful one, or not. His testimony has not been impeached directly. No witness has been put up there to attack his character, or to impeach his veracity. He has given you a plain, distinct, calm narrative of what he says occurred on the morning when this fatal rencounter took place. You are to take that testimony, and judge whether it convinces you that these prisoners, or either of them, committed the crime with which they are charged, to wit, murder." Again after stating the law of self-defence, presenting the idea that, for this defence to avail, the prisoners should have acted under a reasonable belief of danger of great bodily harm, he said, "But in solving that question you will ask yourselves, how could it be that either of the prisoners could have had such a belief? The dead man was unarmed. He was sitting on a trunk taking off his wet clothes, and putting on dry clothes; when ho was approached he rose in his place. He had on nothing at all but his shirt and drawers, and one leg of his breeches was on, and one leg was off. Was the deceased then in such a condition, or did he have such a condition, or did he have such a weapon, as to raise a reasonable apprehension in the minds of the father and son, that the son was in danger of great bodily harm, or of losing his life?"

The constitutional limit as to the judge is: "He shall not charge in respect to matters of fact, but may state the testimony and declare the law." This is brief, concise, and expressive, and leaves the facts proved, including the credibility of witnesses and the force and effect of the testimony, entirely to the jury. We think his honor in the above portions of his charge transcended this rule. State v. White, 15 S. C., 392.

We think also it was error for his honor, at the conclusion of his charge, after having gone over the whole case, defining the different degrees of homicide, to say as he did, "I do not see any room here for a verdict of manslaughter." We wish it distinctly understood, however, that in thus holding we do not intimate an opinion as to the character of the case before the court, as to the degree of guilt, or whether his honor's remark was well founded or not, as applicable to either one or both of the defendants. We desire to be understood, that we rule it was an error in the fact that such a charge was made, thereby

excluding the question of manslaughter from the consideration of the jury in this case.

It may be, that in some rare criminal cases, where there is a conspicuous absence of all testimony applicable to one or more of the degrees into which crime is divided by the law, that the judge would be warranted in stating such absence, and in holding that as to that special degree, or crime, there was no evidence. Such was the case of The State v. Nance (25 S. C., 168), where the court said: "We cannot hold that the judge erred in charging that there was no testimony as to self-defence, or such as could raise a question of manslaughter." So, too, as was incidentally said in the case of The State v. Summers (19 S. C., 94): "If there is no testimony, the judge undoubtedly has the right to say so." But it should be a very clear case, a very conspicuous absence of all testimony to warrant such remark, especially in a case where its effect is to preclude the jury from considering the question of manslaughter, upon which the prisoner may in fact be relying, and of confirming them to the deeper crime of murder.

As we have already stated, we do not mean to say that in our opinion manslaughter was made out in this case as to either of the defendants, and therefore we have not followed the counsel in their argument on the subject of manslaughter, and the alleged testimony n the case bearing upon that question; but we only mean to say that the responsibility was upon the jury to determine the degree of guilt which attached to these parties, and to enable them to solve this vital question the whole case should have gone to them untrammelled by the opinion of the judge.

We do not think that the charge is obnoxious to the exception on the subject of the conspiracy referred to. When what his honor said is read as a whole on that questions, he seems to have sufficiently left it to the jury as a question of fact.

We think it was error for his honor to have stated, that witnesses are examined in the presence of the prisoner in order that the prisoner may stop and correct them upon a false statement. We do not know how this remark was understood by the jury; but if it was understood as expressed, and the prisoners failed to rise and correct the witnesses, it was well calculated to prejudice the prisoners' case, in the event of any false statement.

There are several other exceptions base principally upon detached and incidental expressions of his honor, taken from different portions of the charge, which, in view of the fact that the case must be remanded for a new trial on the grounds stated above, we hardly think it necessary to consider formally. They are, therefore, passed by.

It is the judgment of this court, that the judgment of the Circuit Court be reversed, and the case be remanded for a new trial.

A Sheriff Speaks His Mind

In January 1889, A. M. Salley, sheriff of Orangeburg County, wrote to his son, Alexander Samuel Salley (1871-1961), a Citadel student, concerning the current court session, letters now in the A. S. Salley Papers at the South Caroliniana Library. Columbia, S.C.

18 January -- They are trying the Nortons today. I do not look for a conviction this time, think it will be a mistrial. F. D. Mitchell & Shug Hall are on the jury, and I do not believe they would convict if they saw a murder committed, if five dollars was offered to them the other way.

26 January -- Well, Court is over, and all the white men are out--I have never head of a clearer case in my

life than the Branchvillc case, but it is the hight [sic] of folly to try to convict a white man for killing a poor negro. A certain class think it is something to be proud of. It was perfectly disgusting to me to see men running after those selfe [sic] declared murderers. They had a perfect ovation, and all went immediately to DeMars and treated the crowd. I do not know where we are drifting to. If this goes on no man's life is safe.

The Nortons, father and son, sentenced to be hanged for killing a white man named Hamlin in 1887, had won a new trial on appeal. Their lawyers claimed the elder Norton shot to protect his son, and the jury-after being out about an hour--returned a "not guilty" verdict.

The Branchville case involved the death of Caesar Stevens (black) at the hands of three white men. To Sheriff Sallcys chagrin, jurors needed only five minutes to reach a similar conclusion.

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[NOTE: Since the 1880 census below places the family in South Carolina, at least part of the story above is incorrect. There could not have been any slaves in 1880, could have been a servant or they could have moved towns with South Carolina.]



Leota Fish Moriconi also remebers her mother talking about a person named Mary Dick.

Her mother died in childbirth with her. No known siblings.

Her father left her to be raised by her grandparents whose surname was Edmunds.

Alexander Calhoun Norton was a spy for the Confederates and while dressed in a Yankee uniform stopped in a farmhouse (in Virginia?) to ask about the whereabouts of the Union Army. He met Mary D. Harrison there and they exchanged gifts throughout the war. He came back after the war to marry her as he promised.

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I grew up believing that my grandmother's grandmother was a full-blooded Indian as I was told. I retold that story and was also very proud to be part Native American. This story is part of the reason I got into genealogy. I wanted to learn more about her, like her name for instance. I now know she is Mary Dick Harrison.

Finding Mary D Harrison's ancestors is an interesting story. I got her name and birth and death dates easily enough from Henrietta (Norton) Garvin and her tombstone in Guyton cemetery. I also had a scanned letter that I received from Peggy Bashlor Baker written by my mother's Aunt Vic (Norton) that said Mary was an orphan raised by her grandmother, Annie Edmunds. I found an 1880 Census with AC Norton, Mary and several children that showed Mary's mother and father were born in South Carolina (no names of course). That was the end of the trail for many years. I searched the name Harrison and Edmunds online and saved information, but had no link. While I was in the Savannah area, I took pictures of all headstones that said Harrison or Edmunds just in case. Then I met Mrs Frances Clemmons and her son, Woody in Tusculum, GA. Henrietta says they live in a house that is on the same lot in Tusculum where the picture was taken of Mary, AC and their children. The Clemmons also think it is likely the same lot. They had a newspaper clipping that was a very nice article about Woody's great grandmother, Annie Norton (who married James Clemmons and lived on this property). The article mispelled her maiden name as Morton, but it is clearly Norton. The article is also the only place I had ever seen her full middle name which is Vaughn (as listed in the article). When I got home, I was organizing my material and found a transcribed copy of an old will that showed Martin Marshall had a daughter named Annie Edmunds married to Robert Edmunds. When I searched these three names, I found that Martin Marshall had married a woman named Anne Vaughan (spelled differently than Annie Vaughn Norton, but still looked like a match). I continued to search the Internet and found the Slavery Petitions that had all the names to complete the connection: Richard Harrison (Mary Dick Harrison's father), Anne V. Edmunds (her mother), Mary Harrison herself plus several other relatives including her brother John that I had not known about and her Uncle Robert who petitioned to get the kids back from Richard's father John Harrison Sr. Very interesting and satisfying to finally have found Mary's ancestors. I am still researching the Harrison and Edmunds sides, but the Marshall/Vaughan side is heavily researched. Also, I still have not found the Native American link. Mary is clearly not fullblooded, but I do believe she was at least part Indian since it is such a strong family story that we were all told.

The Cherokee Indians have had continuing dealings with the U.S. Government since the 1700's through treaties, legislation, and the courts. There are probably more federal records concerning the Cherokees than any other tribe. During the 1830's and 1840's, the period covered by the Indian Removal Act, many Indians were forced to remove to what is now Oklahoma. A small number of Indians remained in the southeast and gathered in the North Carolina area where they purchased land and continued to live on the Quala Boundary. Many went into the Appalachian Mountains to escape the removal.

Cherokee Ancestry falls into three main groups:

- 1) Persons listed on the final roll of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma that were closed in 1907 and their descendants.
- 2) Persons enrolled as members of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians of North Carolina and their descendants, Baker Roll.
- 3) Other persons of Cherokee Indian ancestry.

The first groups were those Cherokees who went West and formally organized as the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma. After about a half-century of self-government, a law enacted by Congress in 1906 directed that a final roll be made and each enrollee be given an allotment of land or be paid cash. After that date no names could be added to the final rolls. The 1906 enrollment records are kept by the Bureau of Indian Affairs

The second group, or Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians of North Carolina, are formally organized and have their own requirements for member ship.

Information about the Indian ancestry of persons in the third group of Cherokees is the most difficult to locate. Some of these Indians did not sign up when necessary. The information for this group is best found by using the same methods as used in compiling ancestries of non-Indians. The claims that were

filed in 1906 and were rejected provide the same good source of information that is helpful in tracing Indian ancestry.

In the early part of this century, there were many reasons for leaving your Native ancestry unclaimed. In those days a "guardian" was assigned to full-blooded Native Americans to manage their affairs. Many times the "guardian" benefited more than the Indian did. Voting was a privilege denied Native Americans and women until 1924. Women were discouraged from registering by their Anglo husbands, especially if they were living outside the Indian Territory. Probably the most fearful reason was the removal of the Native Americans to Oklahoma Territory. The reasons varied, yet all had merit to the Native American at that time in history.

Abstract:Robert Edmunds, next friend of minors John Harrison and Mary Harrison, requests a full account of the minors' trust estate and the appointment of a new trustee. Mary E. Harrison, the minors' mother, died in 1842, and their father, Richard B. Harrison, died in 1854. The children are "entitled to a considerable personal estate" from their parents' estates and land from their grandfather; the said property "vested in John Harrison, Senior ... as trustee." Edmunds asserts that Harrison Sr. has mismanaged the trust estate and has refused to "give bond and security for the faithful discharge of his trusts." He further states that the children are due the proceeds from the sale of land. Edmunds reports that said trust estate includes a group of nine slaves. Since the children "own no land to work their slaves on," the petitioner maintains the slaves should be sold. He also charges that said trustee does not devote "any portion of his time and attention" to the slaves held in trust. Therefore, the petitioner prays that a full account of said slaves be made; that the minors' "entire estates" be converted "in the shape of bonds with interest payable" to the Harrison children annually; and that John Harrison Sr. be removed as trustee and "some other fit and proper person appointed in his stead."

Alexander R. Norton. . . was born on a plantation on the May river in Beaufort district, September 2, 1812. After his early training in the common schools he was graduated from the Charleston Medical College and later from the Savannah Medical College. His entire professional career was spent in Robertsville, South Carolina, where he gave arduous and unselfish service to a large circle of patients throughout many years. His death occurred at the age of seventy-five. (War record) Dr. Norton married Julia Elizabeth Greene, who was born in Sereven county, Georgia, in 1817. Her father, John Greene, was also an active member of the medical profession, was a native Georgian, and in addition to his practice conducted a large plantation. It is also noteworthy that he was a pioneer in transportation business on the Savannah river, owning the first "pole boat" that plied between Savannah and up-river ports. Both Dr. Greene and wife are buried in the Buck churchyard on Brier creek, Sereven county, near their old plantation home. And that the upper (having the aforesaid boundary) and that part of Scriven County lying on the south side of Great Ogeechee river as high up said river as Skulls Creek be a separate and distant county - And to avoid a discontent, which would otherwise consequently arise – let our public buildings be established as near as convenient to the centre Thereof. During the last half of the eighteenth century four principal centers of

Quakerism arose in South Carolina and one in Georgia.

These were in Kershaw, Marlborough, Newberry and Union Counties, South Carolina, and in Columbia (now McDuffie) County Georgia. The earliest of these settlements appears to have been in Kershaw County, SC about 1750. Fredericksburg Monthly Meeting, also called Wateree, was set up in this county about 1755 or earlier. The monthly meeting was laid down about 1782, and the meetings for worship

disappeared not long afterward. No records of Fredericksburg Monthly Meeting are known to be in existence.

Bush River Monthly Meeting, in Newberry County. SC was established in 1770; Wrightsborough Monthly Meeting, in Georgia, 1773; Cane Creek Monthly Meeting, in Union County, SC, 1799; Piney Grove Monthly Meeting, in Marlborough County, SC 1802."

"Bush River Meeting was located in Newberry County, in the west-central part of SC. Dr Stephen B WEEKS in 'Southern Quakers and Slavery,' page 115 says: "The group of meetings clustering around Bush River was the most important in SC. The origin of this meeting and the time it began cannot be discovered. William COATE was living near Bush River before 1762 and Samuel KELLY a native of King's County, Ireland, removed to Newberry County, from Camden in 1762. Other early Quaker settlers were John FURNAS, David JENKINS, Benjamin and William PEARSON. Robert EVANS came from Camden, probably between 1762-1769."

In 1770 a committee appointed by Western Quarterly Meeting to visit Friends at Bush River Meeting in South Carolina recommended that a monthly meeting be settled there. This recommendation was approved by the Quarterly Meeting in 11th month, 1770, but the records seem to indicate that the new monthly meeting was not actually held until 4th month, 1772.

Meetings for worship which are mentioned as reporting to Bush River Monthly
Meeting include Bush River, Raburn's Creek, Tiger River, Padget's Creek, Mud
Lick, Allwoods', White Lick, Edisto, Charleston and Rocky Springs.
Early members of Bush River Meeting (names taken from the first pages of the
minutes), in addition to those mentioned by Dr. WEEKS, included Jacob CHANDLER,
Samuel CHAPAMAN, Eli COOK, Isaac COOK, William COOPER, Enos ELLEMAN, Moses
EMBREE, Robert EVANS, Armil FINCHER, Nathan HAWKINS, James HAWORTH, Richard
HENDERSON, Elias HOLLINGSWORTH, William HOLLINGSWORTH, Isaac HOLLINGSWORTH,
John

JONES, Robert MERRICK, Henry MILLHOUSE, David MOTE, David MOTE, Jr., William NEAL, John NELSON, Samuel NELSON, Enoch PEARSON, Samuel PEARSON, William PEMBERTON, Peter RUBLE, David SMITH, Henry STEDHAM, Jonathon TAYLOR, William WRIGHT.

About 1802, moved by a desire to live in a country where no slaves were held, Friends of Bush River began migration to Ohio. Between 1802 and 1807 more than one hundred certificates of removal were issued, most of them being for families. This so depleted the membership that the monthly meeting seems to have been all but abandoned in 1808, though not foramlly laid down until 1822. A minute of Bush River Monthly Meeting, 1806, 6,28 states that the Yearly Meeting "advises the Trustees, James BROOKS, Samuel BROWN, Isaac KIRK and John O'NEAL, to sell or lease Bush River meeting house and lot, Rocky Spring meeting house and lot and a meeting house lot at Camden.

In 1809 the few remaining members of Bush River and Cane Creek Monthly Meetings were joined to New Garden Monthly Meeting by order of New Garden Quarterly Meeting. The same procedure appears to have been followed as to Wrightsborough. The minutes of New Garden Monthly Meeting relating to the former members of Bush River, Cane Creek and Wrightsborough Monthly Meetings are quoted below because it has not been possible, in all case, to separate them and assign each item to the proper meeting.

A few additional minutes, mostly disownments, relating to Bush River Friends between 1809 and 1818 will be found in the New Garden records. Fragmentary minutes in the Bush River book, covering the years 1819 and 1820, indicate and attempt to revive Bush River Monthly Meeting at that time. The attempt met with little success and the meeting was finally laid down about 1822 and the remaining members were attached to Springfield Monthly Meeting. The Springfield minutes recoding this transfer are as follows: 18822,5,8. (Men's minutes). The monthly meeting at Bush River being laid down, this meeting is informed that it is the request of the members of that preparative meeting to become members at Springfield M.M. which request this meeting grants and receives them accordingly;names are as follows:

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John HARRISON was born circa 1792. He married Lucy Wyche RIVES, daughter of Green RIVES (Sr.) and Mary Ridley JONES. He appeared on the census of 1829 at Fairfield Co., SC (local census of free white inhabitants: John Harrison 12). He was one of those appointed to inventory and appraise the estate of James Rochelle. "Nancy E. ROCHELLE and Charles MOORES, adm. of the goods and chattels of James ROCHELLE, deceased, on 29 May 1837 at Fairfield Co., SC.

all the records and family Bible were burned in the John Harrison house. John married Lucy Rives, a member of the prominent family of that name in Columbia, he lived on a part of his father's land, built a fine house, and was the richest man in Fairfield county according to the census of 1850- his land was then valued at \$100,000 and he had 500 slaves; he is referred to as "old John".

#### Dixon House

This old landmark is sadly in need of restoration but it still stands, defying time, in spite of its sad plight. The front doorway is still beautiful and outstanding in design, giving the old place a lasting semblance of dignity and refinement.

The place belonged to Reuben Harrison, a Revolutionary soldier. In the period before the war he was associated with Thomas Woodward, the "Regulator," in keeping law and order. He was twice married: Lucy Burge was the first wife and Nancy Kirkland the second. He died in 1835 and left each of his eight children two thousand acres of land. In addition to this he built homes for his three daughters, leaving the home place to his widow for her life.

One daughter, Frances, married a Brevard. Her home was behind the Darling Jones House [Blink Bonnie, which I visited - Doris] and was built similar to it. It was razed a few years ago but the fine old mantels

and woodwork were saved and are now still in use in a house near Camden. Nancy the second daughter, married a Rochelle, and their big three-story house stood on a hill near what is now "Fairview," The Alcoholic Rehabilitation Center. It finally fell into disuse and was taken down a few years ago. The third daughter, Mary, married Charles Moore, and their house is the only one left standing of the many Harrison homes.

About 1830 all of the daughters and their families sold their property and moved West. John Harrison bought most of his family's estate as his brothers and sisters moved away. He was a very rich man, owning thousands of acres of land and listed as one of the largest slave owners in the upcountry. He was also a sportsman and lover of fine horses. His animals were raced on all of the South Carolina tracks, taking many honors and trophies. His son Eli Hunt Harrison, who married Elizabeth Fleming Douglas, became owner of the Moores' place. Eli and his three sons were all in the Confederate Army. His daughter, Lucy Rives, married Samuel Dixon, from Liberty Hill and owned and lived at the Moores' place which is now called the Dixon place. It is still owned and occupied by their daughters who are all well along in years . . .

... according to family tradition, Cornwallis passed by and rested at the site of this place on his way from Camden to Winnsboro during the Revolutionary War.

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#### Goza House

This old house stood on a high hill below FAIRVIEW until it was razed during the past decade . . . The property on which the house was located was a part of the original Harrison tract that was granted the first of that family to come to South Carolina from Virginia before the Revolutionary War. Reuben Harrison, a son of the first settler, owned this property after the Revolution. He built the house for one of his daughters who married into the Rochelle family. The Rochelles moved West with other members of the family in the 1830s and in 1835 Mrs. Rochelle's brother, John Harrison, purchased her property. Little can be learned of the place from this point until after the War Between the States when the place was occupied by the Goza family. They lived here for many years and the plantation became known as the Goza House . . . When the Gozas left the house several tenants inhabited it and the last to live here was a Negro family. After them it remained abandoned and vacant. It was a bleak, eerie-looking old building, with its porch gone and rear wing faling in, as its empty windows seemed to peer down the road from the lofty perch on a rough hilltop. Many stories and legends became linked with the place and it finally became known as a "haunted house" or the "Ghosty House." The latter name probably originated with and became confused in pronunciation with "Goza."

From the "Working Christian" Baptist Newspaper Yorkville South Carolina Thursday Morning, September 9, 1869

Departed this life, August 4th, Mrs. ANN V. EDMUNDS, in the 73rd year of her age. In all the relations of life, as wife, mother, daughter, sister and friend, our departed sister retained an irreproachable character. She was a consistent member of the Baptist Church on Beulah for years.

Generous and self-sacrificing, cheerful and affectionate, she was the light and joy of her home, the centre around which her children, grandchildren and friends delighted to gather in admiration of the social virtues and truly noble qualities which it should be their highest ambition to imitate. She had her sorrows. Husband and six of her children had gone before her to the eternal world, but realizing the true import of the text, "He doeth all things well," she resigned all to the hands of her covenant God. It was not my privilege to witness the close of her long and useful life, but from one who was by her some days before she died, I have the following account of her last hours. From the first of her illness, she felt that her end had come and was perfectly resigned. She desired her children and friends to come near; she told them to think more of Eternity and less of

the things of time, and sent the same message to her absent ones. She prayed for her children and firends and sang sweetly the verse, "When through the deep waters I call thee to go," throughout.

Raising her eyes to heaven, with a sweet smile she exclaimed--"Beautiful! beautiful! Dear Jesus, to thee I come!" Then quoting that triumphant passage, "Oh death, where is thy sting? Oh grave, where is thy victory?"--bidding farewell to all below, she fell asleep in Jesus. Sleep well, dear sister; for is not thine "--- a glorious sleep, From which none ever wakes to weep?"

She came to the verge of the dark rolling river, Nor shivered nor shrunk from its pitiless waves; For she knew that the Saviour was pledged to deliver Her soul from destruction, her flesh from the grave.

[No. 364.] In Senate, December 7th, 1825.

The Committee on Agriculture and Internal Improvement, to whom was referred the subject of opening and improving a road leading from Savannah to Macon, have had the same under their consideration, and are of opinion that it is a subject worthy the attention of the Legislature, and therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, by the General Assembly of the State of Georgia, That Robert W. Pooler of the county of Chatham, Clement Power of the county of Effingham, William Slater of the county of Bulloch, Joseph Collins of the county of Tatnall, John Chason of the county of Emanuel, Lewis Mattox of the county of Laurens, Henry Solomon of the county of Twiggs, and Robert Coleman, of the county of Bibb, be, and they are hereby appointed commissioners to examine the roads leading from Jencks' bridge, on the Ogechee river, to the town of Macon, in Bibb county; (and should they deem it necessary) they are hereby authorized to lay out anew road on the nearest practicable route between the said places, which, when so laid out, shall be a public road, and shall be worked on and improved by the hands liable to work on roads in the different counties throughout which it passes, in the same manner as other public roads are, and the public Oconee hands shall work on the said road under the direction of said commissioners, or such person as they may appoint, during such part of the months as they cannot be employed in improving the navigation of said river Oconee: Provided, that all expenses attending the laying out and improving said road shall be defrayed by the counties through which it passes; and in case of vacancy of any of said commissioners, by refusal to serve, or otherwise, their places shall be filled by the Justices of the Inferior Court of the county in which such commissioner resided; and any three of said commissioners shall be sufficient to discharge the duties hereby required, provided, a greater number will not attend.

Elizabeth A. Manes, plaintiff in error, vs. James W. SlaTer et al.y defendants in error.

Plaintiffs in ejectment introduced in evidence a deed for the premises in dispute, from Samuel Slater to Ann Slater during her life, with remainder to her children by William Slater, and proved the death of Manes vs. Slater et al.

their mother, Ann Slater. The deed bears date January 1st, 1849. Defendant introduced a deed dated December 4th, 1849, to the same premises, from Ann Slater and William Slater, her husband, to Elmore Manes, and one from the representatives of Manes to Waters, with a transfer of the last deed to defendant. It was not in evidence that Samuel Slater was ever in possession of the premises, nor had any title in him, nor that Ann Slater ever accepted the deed from him, or that she and her husband held under him, or recognized the title as ever being in him, nor that the deed was ever in the possession of Ann Sinter, or of any one under whom defendant claims: Held, That the evidence does not show a common propositus under whom both plaintiffs and defendant claim, and that no title is shown ia the plaintiffs to entitle them to recovery.

Ejectment. Title. Before Judge Schley. Bulloch Superior Court. October Term, 1871.

James W. Slater, Daniel G. Slater and Lavinia Slater brought complaint against Elizabeth A. Manes, for a tract of land containing three hundred and twenty-five acres, more or less, situate in the county of Bulloch, known as the "Beaver Pond tract." The defendant pleaded the general issue, the statute of limitations and title by prescription.

Upon the trial the plaintiffs introduced the following evidence:

1st. Deed from Samuel Slater, executed on January 1?t, 1849, conveying the premises in dispute to Ann Slater for and during her natural life, with remainder to the children she may have by her husband, William Slater.

2d. James W. Slater, one of the plaintiffs, testified that plaintiffs are the children of William and Ann Slater, who have both been dead for some ten years.

Plaintiff's closed. The defendant introduced the following evidence:

- 1st. Deed from William and.Ann Slater, dated December 4th, 1849, conveying the premises in controversy to Elmore Manes.
- 2d. Deed from the administrator and administratrix of Elmore Manes, dated October 5th, 1858, conveying the said land to Erastus Waters.

Manes vs. Slater et al.

3d. Transfer of the deed last aforesaid by Waters to defendant, of same date with the deed.

4th. B. J. Sims testified that Elmore Manes, the husband of defendant, went into possession of the property in dispute more than seventeen years ago, and defendant has been in possession from the date of the transfer of the deed by Erastus Waters to her, up to the present time.

The jury found for the defendant. A motion was made for a new trial because the verdict was contrary to the law and the evidence. The motion was sustained and a new trial ordered. Whereupon, the defendant excepted, and now assigns said ruling as error.

Trippe, Judge.

We presume the Court granted the new trial on the principle that "where both plaintiff and defendant in ejectment deduce title from a common source it is not necessary for either party to go beyond that," as was held in Wood et al., vs. McQuire's children, 17 Georgia, 303. But here this was not exactly the case.' Plaintiffs claim under a deed from Samuel Slater to Ann Slater for life, with remainder to them. Defendant claims under a deed from Ann Slater and her husband, William Slater. No title or possession was ever shown in Samuel Slater, nor was there any evidence that Ann Slater or her husband ever accepted the deed or possession from him, or that the deed from him was ever in her possession, or her husband's, or in the possession of defendant or any one under whom he claims. In fact, the record does not disclose that there was any connection whatever between Samuel Slater and the defendant's title, nor indeed that there was any privity or relationship between Samuel Slater and Ann Slater, except Peoples & Root.

what is recited in the deed of Samuel Slater, and that was introduced by plaintiffs.

The plaintiffs certainly did not make a case when they closed, on which they'could recover; and though the defendant may not have shown a good title in himself, the only question in the case is, whether he, by the introduction of the deed from Ann and William Slater, sufficiently showed title in Samuel Slater to entitle the plaintiffs to a recovery. That deed produced the only danger to defendant, so far as the record discloses. Keep it out, and the battle was won. We cannot tell what the facts are, outside of the record, but nothing stated in it would authorize a recovery by plaintiffs, even with that deed in evidence. Had the plaintiffs have gone one step farther and proved that Ann and William Slater did hold or claim under this deed of Samuel Slater, the result might have been different.

Judgment reversed.

Having him placed on a horse, she returned, leading the horse right by their troops. She wore a cap with a white feather in it to show that she was on the American side. Every British officer pulled off his cap as she passed, and the ranks were opened for her to pass through. The Yankee army never did anything like that. She died at the house of her nephew and niece, Robert G. and Sarah Mosse Norton. The first one who was buried in Robertville Churchyard in 1832. She was 83 years old. The next one buried there was Rev. Martin Swift, the pastor of that church. Aunt Graham had stepchildren only, for one of whom the village of Grahamville is named.

William Norton's Funeral Sermon

The Index Pulpit

A Sermon

Delivered in the Baptist Church, St. Helena, S.C., on the death of Mr. William Norton, who departed this life March, 7, 1817, in the 71st year of his age, by william T. Brantley, A. M., pastor of the Baptist Church in the town of Beaufort.

Whether we die, we die unto the Lord. - Rom. 14:8

An excerpt

Few have lived so devoted to God, and so exemplary before men, as to justify the application of the text to them with more strict fidelity than did our aged brother, Mr. William Norton. To you who hear me, I can speak of his worth with the greater confidence, for you have long known the integrity of his Christian character, and have long seen his zeal and discretion in the service of God. In this house he prayed to god and adored the Saviour. Here he interceded for men, and wept for their miseries. Here has shone the lustre emanating from the consistent tenor of a godly life. In your just sense of his merits, I shall find a warm testimony of the correctness of this imperfect tribute.

He was the fourth son of Jonathon Norton and Mary Ann, his wife, whose maiden name was Chaplin. His grandfather was a native of England, whence he emigrated to South Carolina, and became one of the first settlers of this island, where his descendants were numerous and respectable. Mr. William Norton, the subject of these remarks, was born October 22nd, 1746; was married November 19th, 1771 to Mary Godfrey, of John's Island, and by this connection had seven sons and three daughters. In 1794, the wife of his youth was taken from him by death, and he was left, with his bereaved children, to deplore an irreperable loss. The year following he married Mrs. Dixon, relict of Mr. Thomas Dixon, and had a further accession of four children to his family.

In August, 1816, he was again left, by the death of his wife, to the solitude of bereavement, which he was not long to suffer; for the 7th of March, 1817, full of faith and good fruits, he left this expectant state for one of holy reality and sublime fruition. He was educated an Episcopalian, and passed the early part of his life as an active, useful member of that denomination on this island. His conversion was of that gradual kind, which displays itself more in the progressive holiness of the heart, and the established rectitude of the actions, than in the warmth and power of instantaneous impressions. Notwithstanding this, he entered deeply into experimental sentiments of religion, and felt the force of those profound and searching affections which are essential to all attainments in grace. As he was not remarkable for any one pre-eminent quality in his pious character, it will be necessary to observe the well proportioned union of many excellencies conspicuous in him. To his honorable solicitude for the preservation of divine worship in the place of his nativity, is to be measurably ascribed the erection of an Episcopal chapel here, in the order and support of which he took an active part. At that time, the determination of his mind to the forms of his own church, was so strong, that, in the year 1789, when the late Rev. Joseph Cook, pastor of the Baptist Church at Euhaw, first visited this place, Mr. Norton, would not consent to hear his preaching. After a favorite brother-in-law, Dr. George Mosse, had become convinced of the justness of those grounds upon which the baptists maintain a profession of faith and immersion to be constituent requisites in baptism, and had avowed his convictions by an open adherence to their sentiments, Mr. Norton began to listen more favorably to the arguments by which those sentiments were supported. Being at length fully persuaded that he had not previously submitted to one of the great institutions of Christ, in its clear and scriptural acceptation, he without hesitation applied to Mr. Cook for the adminstration of the ordinance, and was baptized by him, at Euahaw, in 1790. Thus was he emboldened to unite himself to a church, at that time much traduced; being convinced that its principles were conformable to the Scriptures.

His enlightened zeal was now exerted in the cause of vital religion. And as, from conscientious motives, he had embraced a persuasion that had not been honored with the suffrages of his neighborhood, his

situation necessarily became such as to draw largely upon his Christian prudence and resolution. Yet such was his determination in the course he had begun, that the fervor of his spirit was in no respect abated by the coldness of those who could not accord in feeling or in sentiment with the tone of his piety. And his prudent conciliatory deportment was such, as either to defeat or silence opposition. Through many difficulties he perservered, and with the aid of a few others, erected a place of worship on this island, where he had the satisfaction to see many resort, to hear the word of salvation. When there was no regular supply for the pulpet, it was his custom to collect as many as seemed disposed to assemble, and to engage in giving them, especially the negroes, such religious instruction as their cases appeared most to demand. In this we may believe him to have been instrumental in the conversion of many, who ever loved him with sincere affection, and saluted him with evident emotions of gratitude. He long served as one of the deacons of the Beafort Baptist church; and in that capacity was distinguished for his godly sincerity and Christian simplicity. His language and conversation had so much of a gracious savor, that all with whom he had habits of intercourse, were compelled to recognize the heavenly influence under which he lived. It was his great pleasure to promote agreement among bretheren. Discordant spirits and conflicting sentiments he would assiduously endeavor to recall to harmony. In him was conspicuous the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, in the mildness of which his presence imparted a delight to every one who witnessed his life. Though surrounded with the cares of this world, and sharing in the trials of a probationary state, it was evident that "his conversation was in heaven," and he sought "a country" in the immortality of which he would be superior to every sorrow. The interests of Zion engrossed a large portion of his care, and of his conversation. Such was his solicitude for the extension of religion and the prosperity of the church, that he withdrew his membership from a community that was greatly endeared to him by near connections and valuable friendships, that he might aid in the formation of a new church. And, in the circle of his friends, he rarely failed to manifest the prevailing inclination of his soul. The language of another world was delightful to him, and with them that feared the Lord he would most often speak.

The Mothers of Some Distinguished Georgians:

Martha Mosse Lawton, the mother of Gen. Alexander Robert Lawton, of Georgia, was Alartha Mosse, daughter of Dr. George Mosse and his wife, who was a Miss Norton. She was born on St. Helena

Island, Buford District, South Carolina, on September 5, 1788. About the middle of the eighteenth century Dr. George Mosse, an Irish physician, and a graduate of the University of Edinburgh, with his wife emigrated to America and settled in South Carolina, in Beauford District, on the fertile sea island of St. Helena. At the same time the Norton family came from England and settled at the same place. Shortly after their arrival the wife of Dr. Mosse died, and in the course of time he married Miss Norton, the daughter of his fellow emigrant. Seven daughters came of this second marriage, all of whom were married and settled in life before the death of their father. Of these daughters the sixth was Martha.

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#### les of Ante Bellum Hilton Head Island Families

Now must be introduced a gentleman whose family is truly the catalyst in uniting Hilton Head Island and Our Family Circle, his wife already twice mentioned above. History invariably refers to him as Doctor George Mosse. His 1808 Obituary states he was a graduate of the University of Dublin, although that venerable institution is presently unable to locate his records. He arrived in South Carolina from Ireland before October 1767 when he married Elizabeth Martin in the Parish of St. Thomas and St. Denis. After she died in childbirth, he moved to St. Helena's Parish and by 1771 married Dorothy Phoebe Norton whose father, Jonathon Norton, was a Vestryman of the Parish as early as 1751. With his son William, Jonathon Norton built the Chapel of Ease on St. Helena's Island, a tabby building now known as the White Church although it is in ruins, having been accidentally burned in a forest fire in 1888. Dr. Mosse practiced medicine and operated an extensive tannery and leather business. He planted grapes from which he manufactured sugar and wines, indigo, cane from which he made sugar and rum, and benne or sesame, prized for the valuable oil extracted from its seed. His bills to the Commissioners of the Treasury of the State of South Carolina for many of these items during the years 1782-1785 may

still be seen in the Department of Archives in Columbia. It has been recorded that Dr. Mosse owned land on Hilton Head. Although its exact location is not now known, it is thought to have been at the south end. At any rate he knew the island well enough, having surveyed it and made a detailed map of it in 1783, dividing it into land lots for further development by Benjamin Bayley as agent for Henry Bayley, heir of Landgrave John Bayley of Ballingclough, Tipperary to whom most of the island had been granted as early as August 1698.

Dr. Mosse's knowledge of the area is illustrated by the story recorded by his granddaughter that he was made a prisoner of war by the British following Cornwallis' victory at the Battle of Camden in May 1781 where he served as a surgeon, was marched to Charleston and imprisoned there in the harbor aboard the Prison Ship Torbay. Official records indicate he was also imprisoned on the Prison Ship Pack Horse. The granddaughter's version says the prisoners were being shipped southward to St. Augustine and, having been allowed the freedom of the deck because of the heat and crowded conditions in the quarters below deck, when the ship passed Hilton Head Island Dr. Mosse dived overboard and swam ashore to freedom. Dr. Mosse and Dorothy Phoebe Norton were parents of seven children, all daughters, all of whom they raised and lived to see well-married. The first five children were all baptized in St. Helena's Church but in 1789 Dr. Mosse was talked by Rev. Joseph Cook of Euhaw into joining the Baptists, as were ultimately his brother-in-law, William Norton, and even his sister-in-law, Elizabeth Norton Graham. This wealthy and highly respected lady, known by all the Mosse sisters as "Aunt Graham", was the wife of the Rev. William Eastwick Graham who was sent by the Bishop of London in 1775 to be Rector of Prince William Parish. Following the barabarous destruction of his elegant Church at Sheldon by General Augustine Prevost in may 1779, he espoused the American cause and was frequently associated with Dr. Mosse in ventures on behalf of the patriots. He was also the owner of plantation lands on Hilton Head Island adjoining his nephew, William Pope, Sr. Shortly after 1790 Dr. Mosse moved his family to Savannah where they lived on the southeast corner of Broughton and West Broad Streets. In February 1793 his sixteen year old daughter, Elizabeth, there married James Stoney of 770-acre Otterburn (variously Otter Hall and Otter Hole) Plantation, Hilton Head Island.

Sketch of a Family Prominent in Georgia and South Carolina. Centreville, Miss., May 16, 1891 --

George Mosse was a native of Ireland, and coming to the United States a thoroghly educated gentleman, as well as physician, he settled in South Carolina on the island of St. Helena, near Mr. William Norton, a highly educated and cultivated gentleman from England, whose descendants are now numerous in Georgia and South Carolina and in other places. They were Episcopalians and Dr. Mosse, marrying the sister of Mr. Norton, they lived for a number of years on terms of intimacy and reared large families there. Dr. Mosse employed a private teacher in his family and gave to his seven daughters - of whom I spoke in my last - the best educational advantages of that time. When advanced in live he gave his daughters the advantages of a boarding school in the city of Charleston. His eldest daughter, Esther Maria, who married Captain P. McKinzie, had a piano guitar - a guitar with keys. Jane, the fourth daughter, the mother of J. S. Lawton of Atlanta, Ga., took lessons on the piano, one having been given to her by Aunt Graham, a wealthy sister of her mother.

Dr. George Mosse in process of time became a Baptist. As there was no church there he went to the main and became a member of the Euhano church and was baptised by Rev. Joseph Cook. Soon his wife and her brother, William Norton, followed, and in a while they constituted a church and built a meetinghouse at St. Helena. Dr. Mosse, besides his profession of medicine, carried on a tannery and kept a large store for the benefit of the community generally. Three of his seven daughters married on St. Helena, and he then removed to Savannah, Ga., where he was port physician and a deacon of the First Baptist church. After six or seven years (1806) he moved to Blackswamp, S. C., and bought a large quantity of land from some of the families who emigrated to Mississippi in 1806 - Peter Robert, Rev. Alex Scott, John Grimball, and Cheney, and others. He was useful in the church at Robertville as deacon, but only lived to make one crop, when he died in 1807 and was buried on his own plantation,

hoping to make a graveyard there. His wife followed him in seven weeks and was buried by his side. In process of time Professor Terrence Hughes, the second husband of Aunt Betty M. Hughes, died and was buried by them and so these graves were alone in an old field and now are not known to any living person. Dr. George Mosse was a good and great man - useful in his day and time, and his numerous descendants will be glad to have these reliable data concerning him. These have been prepared by the assistance of Mrs. Martha Norton Buckner, now of Waycross, Ga.

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Excerpt from A History of Savannah and South Georgia

...[Dr. George Mosse] was a notable character in the coast country of South Carolina and in Savannah. He was born, reared and educated for the medical profession in the University of Dublin, Ireland. Soon after his graduation he came as a physician to America and settled on the Island of St. Helena, where he subsequently became the owner of a large amount of landed property. In addition to this professional practice he was a large planter and a manufacturer of leather. He became in time a man of considerable wealth, and of prominence in this section of the country. Both the Nortons and the Mosses were originally members of the Protestant Episcopal church, but after coming to America they became devoted members of the Baptist church. Dr. George Mosse, at his own expense, built a house of worship on the Island of St. Helena. The advantages for education on the island were extremely meagre, so in order to better educate his younger children, in about 1799 or 1800, he removed his family to Savannah. He had a large family and one of his daughters, Martha, became the wife of Col. Alexander Lawton. They were the parents of Gen. A.R. Lawton, now deceased, who was one of the most distinguished lawyers in Savannah, a brigadier general in the Confederate army, and for a long time the general attorney of the Central of Georgia Railroad. Members of the Norton family lived on the Island of St. Helena for over a hundred years and have been closely identified with the history of that island, as well as with the near-by towns of South Carolina; Beaufort, Bluffton, Robertville and Black Swamp, and with Savannah.

To the Printers of the Savannah Museum

#### Gentlemen,

Observing in your paper of the 20th inst. an indirect attack on my integrity, by Mr. Richard Bland, I have to remark that he has no occasion to trouble the public with his caution; the most advisable way for him to have proceeded would have been to have paid the balance due to me, as per accompt current, lately delivered to him in which all his credits with the Note he refers to, are stated, and which Note, from his refusing to leave a matter in dispute between us to arbitration, is held as a collateral security for the balance due me. That I would further observe that Mr. Bland has no receipt which does not specify either at bottom, or on the back of it, that I have yet an open accompt against him.

On the old Brannen Plantation off US30, along the Savannah River and Brier's Creek in Screven Co. is a cemetery with the descendants of Rev. War soldier Benjamin GREENE and wife Eleanor, including their children: Benjamin, Jr., Elizabeth, Thomas and William. A published Screven Co. Cemetery book graphically displayed broken tombstones but has transcribed many of the family. A 23 Dec. 1816 Recorded Indenture of the Division of the Estate of Benjamin Greene lists the family. Eleanor remarried William Nicks who also lived on the estate until his death c1812. She moved to Thomasville, Thomas Co. and purchased land in Leon Co., Terr, of Florida c1828. Possibly died in 1834. Is she buried in the family cemetery? What was her maiden name? Was it Bryant? First son John Bryant Greene may be a clue. Benjamin was brother of John, William and McKeen, sons of Thomas. Will share and exchange data.

Thomas Greene (1787-1853) is among the children of Eleanor () Greene Nicks and Benjamin Greene buried in Green Cemetery on old Brannen Plantation on River road off (US) 301 (in Screven County).

In consideration of the care and attention bestowed on me by my wife NANCY HARRISON. I give and bequeath unto my said Wife the four following Negro Slaves, namely, HARRY & his wife. MARIA, and their two children LETTY and PEGGY, with the increase of the females, also, my riding Horse, for her use & behoof for and during her natural life only. These slaves I give in addition to what I settled on her in her marriage contract. From and after the death of my wife the Slaves given to her above in this will,

and the future increase of the females are to return to my Son DAVID HARRISON, his heirs and assigns forever.

As I have already given to my three children, namely, KIRKLAND HARRISON, FRANCES BREVARD, and DAVID HARRISON, all that I ever intended for their share or part of my estate except the revision in those negroes above mentioned, they are to have no part in my present property or Estate. The remainder of my estate that I have not already given off I wish divided as follows.- That is to say, To the children of WILLIAM HARRISON, for their sole use and benefit, one Seventh part, share & share alike- To RICHARD B. HARRISON one Seventh part. To JOHN HARRISON one Seventh part. To the children of WILLOUGHBY HARRISON, one Seventh part, share and share alike. To JAMES HARRISON one Seventh part, to my Daughter NANCY ROCHELLE the wife of ANDERSON ROCHELLE, one Seventh part. and to my Daughter MARY MOORES, the wife of CHARLES MOORES one Seventh part. But I wish it distinctly understood that my Son DAVID is to keep and remain in quiet possession of all my Negroes, Horses & mules, except those given my wife, until he has paid the last dollar for the land he purchased of JOHN J. MICKLE. And I hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my Son DAVID HARRISON as the Sole Executor of this my last will and Testament, revoking all other wills and Testaments whatsoever. Note: "[Nathaniel] Greene, with his wretched force, almost naked, swarming with vermin, thinned by two battles, and scrawny with famine, took post at Mr. Reuben Harrison's. They needed every thing. They tented under the blue arch of kind heaven, slackened nothing of purpose and resolves, and looked manfully forward to happier times and brighter days. Mr. Harrison had been with Sumter in his perils, his partial success, and his defeats, He thought like a soldier, and he felt like a man. He ordered his people to forward to the army breadstuffs, vegetables, fat cattle and fat sheep in plenty. Greene remained at his bivouac for a whole week, living on the hospitality of Mr. Harrison. When about to march, having no strong box, he tendered his host a certificate for the bountiful supplies he had furnished. 'No, said Harrison, 'we are all engaged in the same great cause. You are welcome to all you have received. Your success will be my pay.' served in Revolution as a Pvt. footman in Capt. Thomas Starke's Co., [Col.] Thomas Taylor's Regt., Henderson's Brigade, SC Militia, for 65 days on an expedition at Four Holes and Edisto River in 1781. He served 20 days as a horseman in the same co. under command of Lt. Miller. He was paid for this service in 1785, came back to Fairfield County and began to buy cheap land. Deeds show he bought land on the Wateree River and its tributary creeks every year until his death in 1835.

In August 1780, "... a detachment sent by Sumter [Brigadier General Thomas Sumter, 'the Gamecock'] again embarrassed the British within a short ride of Camden. At Wateree Ferry south of Camden the British had built a redoubt and garrisoned it with thirty troops under the command of Colonel Matthew Carey. Moving toward Fort Carey was a British supply convoy from Charleston. Sumter knew about it, of course, and resolved to capture it. He sent Colonel Thomas Taylor with a strong force on the mission. On 15 August, Taylor surprised and captured Colonel Carey and his men, and thirty-six wagons loaded with supplies, including rum, which surely gladdened militia hearts. He learned from the prisoners the location of the convoy, and rode out and took another prize: fifty wagons with supplies, six wagons with baggage, 300 head of cattle, and some sheep. He then rejoined Sumter, who slowly began moving north. But the affair had not ended. The British wanted their goods and people back, and encumbered as he was with plunder and prisoners, Sumter's column could not move with its accustomed speed. Taylor's

coup is also connected with the American army that had marched under de Kalb and was then given by Congress to Horatio Gates . . .

"Marching fast, [Major James] Wemyss, [the British hanger of men and burner of Presbyterian churches] reached Moore's Mill shortly after midnight to find that Sumter had moved. Local Tories placed him five miles down the Broad River at Fish Dam Ford, where there was an old stone weir probably constructed by the Cherokee. The Rebels were camped on the east bank of te Broad. Sumter's tent was near the road by the ford, and apparently Wemyss had intelligence from local Tories about its precise location. had intelligence from local Tories about its precise location. The units of Colonels Winn, Taylor, Bratton, Hill and Lacey, were spread around behind, with the latter three on a ridge some 200 yards from the ford. That 200 yards was open ground. Sumter, as usual, had partially undressed and went to sleep in his tent. His colonels, however, uneasy at being so close to the enemy's main army, remained alert. Campfires were built, but the men were ordered to lay on their arms beyond the firelight. Pickets were thrown out to warn of danger.

"Wemyss pushed on, too fast it seemed to follow Cornwallis's orders to attack at daybreak. About 1 a.m. 9 November Wemyss bumped into Sumter's pickets, who got off five rounds that, as it turned out, decided the outcome of the fight. Wemyss was shot off his horse. With a shattered knee and broken arm he was out of the fight. Lieutenant John Stark took over. He was ignorant not only of Cornwallis' express orders to Wemyss but also of the ground before him and the strength of the enemy. He gave the order to charge and the British horsemen galloped in the darkness against an invisible enemy. But the British were quite visible, for they rode into the light cast by Rebel campfires. Colonel William Hill, who was at the fight, claimed that the British 'collected in great numbers around their fires and began to plunder, not supposing they would meet with any interruption, and while they were in the position around the fires and began to plunder, not supposing they would meet any interruption, and while they were in this position around the fires the Americans, taking advantage of the light, poured on them such a fire that they killed & wounded a great many.' Lieutenant Stark withdrew a short distance and did what he ought to have done in the first place, ordering his men to dismount and fight on foot. The men of the 63rd Foot formed, fixed bayonets, and went forward again. Colonel Thomas Taylor's men received the assault like regulars and delivered a volley at close range. Some of Taylor's men were beyoneted. The action was decided in the Rebels' favor when Colonel Edward Lacey's command on the British flank began firing at the 63rd from the woods . . .

"Lieutenant Stark wisely decided to withdraw from the field . . . thirty miles to Winnsboro [the position of Cornwallis and the main army]. He left under a flag of truce, and under the care of a sergeant major four dead and twenty wounded.

"The Rebels suffered four dead and ten wounded. Sumter spread the word of a victory not over Tory militia but over regulars, and some of them from a British line infantry regiment. Recruits flocked to his standard. Cornwallis was furious . . . There was obviously only one answer to the problem of Thomas Sumter, and his name was Banastre Tarleton. Cornwallis recalled him immediately . . .

"Cornwallis's urgent order reached his cavalry commander 14 November 1780 and Tarleton . . . troopers of the British Legion turned their horses west that day and rode away from smoking ruins and bitter enemies along the upper Santee . . .

"Colonel Thomas Taylor was sent [by Sumter] to raid the British depot at Summer's Mills . . . Sumter did not know that Tarleton was heading in his direction and coming on fast.

"Tarleton, 190 dragoons of the Legion, and mounted infantry and their horses were travel weary after their three-day forced march... crossed the river and continued until 10 p.m. when they bivouacked well inside the Dutch Fork. On 19 November Tarleton's scouts ranged widely in quest of information about Sumter's whereabouts. One party pinpointed Sumter's location and intention. He was north of Tarleton's bivouac, gathering to attack a British post held by Tory militia at Williams Plantation, some fifteen miles north of Ninety Six. Tarleton immediately broke camp, marched that night to the Enoree, and made a late camp at the mouth of Indian Creek. Still Sumter remained unaware of Tarleton's proximity.

"Then fortune smiled on Sumter. Sometime in the early morning hours of 20 November a British soldier deserted from the 63rd Foot, stole a horse, rode to Sumter's camp, and revealed Tarleton's location, strength, and mission. . .

"Sumter and his officers faced a difficult decision. They had upwards of 1,000 mostly seasoned Back Country militia. Tarleton had only 520 men. But they were all regulars, over 300 of them British Army regulars, and they were led by a commander who was all fighter, as feared as hated, and never defeated.

. At a council of war the colonels were unanimous: find a strong defensive position, wait for Tarleton, and fight him when he arrived. It was a recommendation that suited Sumter's temperament, for like his adversary he was a born fighter. Colonel Thomas Brandon, who had followed Sumter's rival James Williams until Williams's death at King's Mountain, was on home ground and suggested that the place to fight was Captain William Blackstock's farm on the Tyger River. Leaving Captain Patrick Carr with a small detachment at the Enoree to give early warning of Tarleton's approach, Sumter rode north with the militia regiments to Blackstocks and one of the most important engagements of the Carolina campaign. The old battlefield is about ten miles north of Union, South Carolina . . .

"Tarleton was pushing hard. In the late afternoon his scouts had found Sumter's trail leading to a ford at the Enoree, where Captain Carr waited with his detachment on the other side . . .

"About midafternoon it was apparent that the infantry and artillery could not keep up, whereupon Tarleton did what one would expect . . . Bloody Ban set his usual torrid pace with the Legion horse and the mounted infantry of the 63rd Foot. Not very far ahead of him Major William Candler of Georgia was returning from a foraging expedition and had just entered Sumter's lines when Tarleton's van came into view and fired on the Rebel pickets. Colonel Thomas Taylor and his party, returning from his raid on the British supply depot at Summer's Mills, was not far behind Candler and came at the gallop with wagons loaded with flour and Tarleton's van at his heels. Taylor slipped into Sumter's lines with little to spare." The battle of Blackstocks was a decisive victory for the American Rebels. "The best estimate of Rebel casualties is three killed and four wounded. Tarleton lost ninety-two killed and seventy-six wounded, or sixty-two percent of the command that engaged the enemy. Of the Rebel wounded, however, one was Thomas Sumter, and it was serious . . . out of action for the next two months . . . .

"On 17 July 1781 a British force took up a strong position protected by an artillery piece and buildings and fencing at Quinby Bridge on the Shubrick Plantation, some thirty miles from Charleston. [The Swamp Fox, Francis] Marion and [Light Horse Harry] Lee had reconnoitered before Sumter came up with his partisans late in the afternoon. T hey advised that the British position was too strong to attack. Sumter disagreed and formed a battle line for his favorite tactic: frontal assault. Marion and Lee begged him to at least wait until their own artillery piece, a six-pounder, arrived, but he refused. In the fighting that followed the Americans were defeated with costly losses, especially to Marion's Brigade and the regiment of Colonel Thomas Taylor, a Sumter lieutenant. The rest of Sumter's forces fired from the protection of buildings and did not take part in the assault.

"Quinby Bridge was the end of line for Sumter as a commander. Light Horse Harry Lee, in disgust and without a farewell or by your leave, marched off with his Legion to [General Nathaniel] Greenes' camp in the High Hills of Santee, where he told the commanding general [of the Southern department] precisely what he thought of Thomas Sumter. Francis Marion gathered his dead and wounded and left for familiar haunts. It remained, however, for a man who had faithfully followed Sumter since the early desperate days to deliver a scathing rebuke that echoes down the centuries. Colonel Thomas Taylor's son told Lyman Draper that his father walked up to Sumter, who was sitting under a shade tree, and said, 'Sir, I don't know why you sent me forward on such a forlorn hope, promising to sustain me, & failed to do so, unless you designed to sacrifice me. I will never more serve under you.'

"Following Quinby Bridge Sumter disbanded his force and retired to North Carolina for the summer. This infuriated Greene, who eventually dismounted Sumter's men."

William's son Reuben Harrison, the progenitor of the Longtown Harrisons, was a young man during the Revolution and according to the record he served on an expedition at Four Holes and Edisto River in Gen. Henderson's Brigade, under Capt. Starke. He served as a Colonel during 1781 under Gen. Henderson, while residing on the Catawba River. He was paid for this service in 1785, came back to Fairfield County and began to buy cheap land.

Reuben was born circa 1760 at Wateree River, Craven Co., SC. He began military service in 1781 at Fairfield Co., SC, served in Revolution as a Pvt. footman in Capt. Thomas Starke's Co., Thomas Taylor's Regt., Henderson's Brigade, SC Militia, for 65 days on an expedition at Four Holes and Edisto River in 1781. He served 20 days as a horseman in the same co. under command of Lt. Miller. He was paid for this service in 1785, came back to Fairfield County and began to buy cheap land. Deeds show he bought land on the Watteree River and its tributary creeks every year until his death in 1835.

Harrisonburg, laid out upon 50 acres of land belonging to Thomas Harrison, was legally established in May, 1780, by the same Act that gave recognition to the town of Louisville, in the county of Kentucky. The place in early days was often called Rocktown; for example, Bishop Asbury designates it by that name in his journal, in 1795; and as late as 1818, perhaps later, the name Rocktown was frequently used. In 1797 the town was enlarged by an addition of 23 1/2 acres, laid off in lots and streets, from the lands of Robert and Reuben Harrison. In 1808 an Act was passed enabling the freeholders and housekeepers resident in the town to elect five trustees annually; and by the same Act the trustees were authorized to raise \$1000 by taxation for the purchase of a fire engine, hooks, and ladders. All the men of the town were to constitute the Harrisonburg Fire Company.

The "boom" period was marked by decided "plants" and prophecies in Harrisonburg, not all of which grew or came true; but, as already indicated, the town has had a constant and healthy growth. It is noted as the best horse market in the Valley. In 1899 Harrisonburg voting precinct was divided into East Harrisonburg and West Harrisonburg.

On Christmas day, 1870, about 4 o'clock in the morning, fire broke out on the south side of the public square, and burned all the buildings over to the old stone Waterman house. The loss totaled \$50,000 or \$60,000.

In 1875 the first town clock for Harrisonburg was put in the court house tower.

In 1887, and thereabout, Harrisonburg had no saloons.

Abstract: Green Rives, guardian of the minor Nancy Clark, seeks to collect sums owed to her from her late father's estate. Edmond Clark died intestate in 1803 possessed of "Negroes, Horses Household and kitchen furnature and other articles of utility." His widow, Elizabeth Clark, administered the estate until she married Daniel Darby, at which time he took over the administration. Elizabeth's letters of administration were revoked in 1807 and reassigned to Drury Bynum. Bynum has since been in control of the estate and has "been in the receipt of the proceeds of the said Estate and the hire of the said Negroes." The petitioner was appointed as Nancy's guardian in 1810. Though still a minor, "Nancy is now approaching the years of maturity," and Rives "has her placed at a Boarding school, for which he is obliged to incur a considerable expense." Rives has applied to the Darbys and Bynum to account to him for Nancy's share of the estate, but they have all refused; Darby because he claims to not have any of the

property, and Bynum because he alleges that Darby "wasted the Estate and it is now necessary for him to keep the balance in his hands." In 1764, HOWELL Edmunds had a tract of land which was located between the Congaree and Wateree rivers. In 1767, DAVID Edmunds had a tract of land located on Cabin Branch, which was on the road to Russell's Ferry. Neither HOWELL or DAVID remained on their tracts of land and in 1768 both tracts of land were "ordered" for other persons. DAVID also served during the Revolution and was awarded a tract of land for his services.

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THOMAS Edmunds, who's will

was proved on January 11, 1832, bequeathed a tract of land located on both sides of "Lower Cedar Creek" to his son Robert. Robert Edmunds was married to Ann Vaughan. THOMAS Edmunds also had a daughter, Mary, who was married to John Marshall. THOMAS'S will also mentions two grandchildren, William Thomas Marshall and Elizabeth Marshall. It is not known whether HOWELL, DAVID and THOMAS are of the same family.

The said trustees, or the survivors or survivor of them, shall out of the first monies coming to their hands from the said sale pay to the lawful representatives of the said William Bennet, deceased, the amount of the money which was advanced by him in his lifetime to the said tribe of Indians, with legal interest thereon to the time of such payment. The said trustees, or their survivors, shall apply five pounds of the residue of the said purchase money first (exhausting the interest) to the annual maintenance of each of the said Indians, so long as there be any of the said tribe living; and when the said tribe shall become extinct, the said trustees, or the survivors or survivor of them, shall thereupon pay so much of the purchase money and interest, as shall remain unapplied to the purposes aforesaid, into the public treasury. SECT. 3. So much of any act or acts, as comes within the purview of this act, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

Martin Marshall came to Nova Scotia in 1784 and owned land at Shelburne. His previous activities are unclear; however, I think he may have come from the south as he will return to Georgia before 1800. The 1786 tax rolls of Shelburne list Martin Marshall as a Millwright; however, he is noted as 'privately gone'. Martin would marry Ann Vaughn, daughter of John Vaughn in 1788. During the same year, Martin would buy lots 9 and 10 from Anthony Vaughn Sr. The Poll Tax of 1791 shows Martin as living on Oak Island and he self-identified as a wheelwright. Martin would sell both of these properties in 1792 to Neal McMullen, step father of John Smith. Martin and his wife would remove themselves from the area. Records do show a Martin Marshall to be seeking land in Burke-Screven Georgia. A book called "Family Bibles of Gasper County Georgia" includes a reference to Martin Marshall's family bible. We know it to be him as Ann (Vaughn) from Chester is his wife, etc. Of all the follow-up books to find, obtaining Martin's family bible is most important. Martin was most likely attracted by the Vaughn brothers to Chester for his millwright skills and stands to reason he may have been an employee of the Vaughn brothers for their lumber and grist mill on Vaughn Creek.

JOHN Marshall came from Lincolnshire, England with his wife and two sons, William and Martin. In 1770, they settled on Cedar Creek near Horrell Hill. William Marshall had two sons, Frank and John (II). Frank was never married. John (II) married Mary Edmunds.

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Supposedly, Martin Marshall went to the West Indies as a young boy, married there, but his wife died. On his way back to the colonies, he was shipwrecked and was carried to Nova Scotia. In Nova Scotia, he married Ann Vaughan. Before 1800, he moved to Carolina with his wife and 2 daughters.

Property Owners of Oak Island to 1795

Martin Marshall came to Nova Scotia in 1784 and owned land at Shelburne. His previous activities are unclear; however, I think he may have come from the south as he will return to Georgia before 1800. The 1786 tax rolls of Shelburne list Martin Marshall as a Millwright; however, he is noted as 'privately gone'. Martin would marry Ann Vaughn, daughter of John Vaughn in 1788. During the same year, Martin would buy lots 9 and 10 from Anthony Vaughn Sr. The Poll Tax of 1791 shows Martin as living on Oak Island and he self-identified as a wheelwright. Martin would sell both of these properties in 1792 to Neal McMullen, step father of John Smith. Martin and his wife would remove themselves from the area. Records do show a Martin Marshall to be seeking land in Burke-Screven Georgia. A book called "Family Bibles of Gasper County Georgia" includes a reference to Martin Marshall's family bible. We know it to be him as Ann (Vaughn) from Chester is his wife, etc. Of all the follow-up books to find, obtaining Martin's family bible is most important. Martin was most likely attracted by the Vaughn brothers to Chester for his millwright skills and stands to reason he may have been an employee of the Vaughn brothers for their lumber and grist mill on Vaughn Creek.

- 1. The island was first granted in 1753 to John Gifford and Richard Smith, two fishing agents from New York.
- 2. Oak Island is first mentioned by name during 1764 when it was first surveyed and divided by Josiah Marshall.
- 3. Property ownership commenced in 1766.
- 4. Robert Melvin and family would come to own the vast majority of the island well before 1795.

- 5. The Vaughn family would own a good portion of the island including the property adjacent to the MP with a family member living on the island before 1791.
- 6. John Smith's father was granted an Oak Island lot during 1785.
- 7. Samuel Ball and Donald McGinnis bought property on the island during 1787/88.
- 8. John Smith, his mother and step-father moved to the island in 1789
- 9. The Poll Tax of 1791 shows Samuel Ball, Donald McGinnis, Martin Marshall and wife Ann (Vaughn), Neil McMullin and Margret (John Smith's mother), and John Munro all living on Oak Island.
- 10. Most importantly, these documents will speak to a community who supported the American cause during the Revolution with a surprising number of politicians who owned island property and who were connected to smuggling activities. The folks of Chester and Onslow were openly supportive of the American cause with documents showing these two communities were in communication for this purpose.

Book: The Oak Island mystery 1967 Reginald V. Harris

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"Classic" version of the discovery story:

On a summer day in 1795, teenager Daniel McGinnis came across a circular depression in the ground. On closer examination he saw other signs that suggested that someone had buried something in the area. Over the next few days along with two friends, Daniel began to dig. Two feet down the boys discovered a layer of flagstones. At ten feet there was a platform of oak logs, and the same at 20 and 30 feet. The boys abandoned their digging, returning eight years later to continue their search. This time they reached 90 feet, finding a layer of charcoal at 40 feet, putty at 50 feet and coconut fiber at 60 feet. Something was found every 10 feet, and at 90 feet a stone inscribed with strange writing was uncovered. At 90 feet water seeped in and stopped further digging. The cache had been ingeniously designed with passages that flood the pit thereby foiling any attempts to reach what may be buried there. Further attempts uncovered a layer of spruce and what may have been a cask of coins at around 100 feet.

Over the years countless people have tried to reach the supposed treasure using various methods and technology. Corporations have been formed and fortunes spent to try and solve the, as yet, unexplained mystery.

Oak Island

Daniel Vaughn originated from Scituate, Providence, Rhode Island (via New Dublin NS, 1764). Daniel was in the King's Navy out of Rhode Island. Documents show him to have engaged as a privateer against the French during the French and Indian Wars of the late 1750s. For his servitude, he and his brothers were privately granted 900 acres within Shoreham. During the American Revolution, they bought Rafuse Island, possessed the second largest number of Oak Island lots, and operated a lumber and grist mill at the mouth of Vaughn Creek. This creek is the modern day dividing line between the Western shore and Martin's Point. The mill would have been in clear view from the western end of Oak Island. The Vaughn bothers were also granted the majority of the western shore area, which spanned from the Gold River to Martin's point. While Vaughn Creek would not be a very good choice for a mill due to the low volume of water flow, it would provide an ideal and legitimate cover for a ship being anchored off Oak Island. Daniel would quickly depart the Chester area for Horton in 1791, then by 1793 for New Brunswick. This was part of nothing less than an exodus from Chester by many old Planter generation families. They would depart Chester in such haste that they did not bother to sell their properties. Daniel and family, along with his brother-in-laws from Newport would go on to build the largest wooden ship building business in Canada.

William Cone R.S.**-[336] and **Keziah Eudel Barber**-[402], was born on 31 Oct 1766 in North Carolina,<sup>3</sup> died on 6 Jun 1835 in Bulloch County, Georgia <sup>3</sup> at age 68, and was buried in Cone Family Cemetery, Ivanhoe, GA.<sup>3</sup>

Aaron and Susan were the first generation to have children in Georgia. Aaron was born in North Carolina along the Pee Dee River and moved south to Georgia with his father. In 1788 Aaron married Susannah Marlow and their first son was born in 1790 at Ivanhoe, Bulloch County, Ga. Aaron was a wealthy man, owned large land estates with many slaves and carried on extensive planting operations. Re: MEN OF MARK IN GEORGIA by Bernard Suttler.

Aaron and Susannah are buried in the old Cone Cemetery at Ivanhoe. These graves no longer have visible markers as of visit in 1996. The home of Aaron Cone is located near the original Ivanhoe site and remains in the family after more than 150 years. His descendants continue to farm the surrounding area not far from the Ogeechee River.

1. AARON2 CONE (WILLIAM1)1 was born October 31, 1766 in North Carolina, and died June 06, 1835 in Bulloch Co., Ga.. He married (1) SUSANNAH MARLOW 1788, daughter of ROBERT MARLOW and ANN MULLER. Aaron moved with his parents from North Carolina to Cheraw District, S.C. in 1779, thence to Effingham Co., Ga, later being cut into Bulloch Co. in its formation in 1796. Aaron married, 1788, Susannah Marlow in South Carolina. She was the daughter of Robert Marlow, R.S. and wife Ann, of Effingham and Screven Counties. They had twelve children.

Mr. Cone served as a courier in the American Revolution at the age of 16, and was taken prisoner on the Oconee River. (Auth.: His daughter, Frances Cone who married Joseph Edwards)

Aaron Cone was 2nd Lieutenant, Effingham County Militia, oct. 9, 1787, to Oct. 14, 1790, also as a private in Capt. Stephen Mills' Company, Effingham County Militia, 1793. He was a farmer and owned much land and many slaves. His home plantation was known as Ivanhoe where he died in 1832. His wife Susannah, died in 1818 at Ivanhoe, and Mr. Cone then married Hannah Kirby who survived him; no issue by her. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

The following is the Will of Aaron B. Cone who was buried at Ivanhoe, Bulloch County, Georgia In the name of God - Amen.

I, Aaron Cone of the State of Georgia and County of Bulloch, being infirm in body but in perfect memory, thanks be to God, calling into mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it was appointed for all men to die, I make and ordain this my last will and testament. That is to say principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul unto the honor of Almighty God that gave it and my body to the ground to be buried in a decent and Christian manner and form at the discretion of my friend and Executor, nothing doubting but I shall at the last general resurrection receive it again by the power of Almighty God. And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless

me within this life I do give and dispose of in the following manner -

Firstly, I do give and grant unto my son Peter Cone the following tracts of land. One tract surveyed for and granted to Wm. Denmark (then in Effingham County but now in Bulloch) on the 23rd of December 1793, it has been deeded from Wm. Denmark to Stephen Denmark from Stephen Denmark to Simeon Travis from Simeon Travis to Matthew Carter and from Matthew Carter to myself. Also I give unto my son Peter Cone the three tracts of land which he deeded to me. Also I give him all the debts due from him to me, likewise one Negro man named Tom and also one bed and furnature.

Secondly, I do give and grant unto my son James Cone one Negro man named Jack, one rifle gun and one large pot; he has had his bed and furnature.

Thirdly, I do give and grant unto my son Robert Cone one Negro by named Dick, one large pot, also one musket gun; he has had his bed and furnature.

Fourthly, I do give and grant unto my son Barber Cone three tracts of land surveyed for myself in Bulloch County, Tommy McCall's land and great Ogechee; one tract of five hundred acres granted to me on the 14th of October 1873 and the two other tracts of land, one contains four hundred forty four acres, the other last tract contains six hundred acres. Each one of the two last mentioned tracts were granted to me on the 16th of November 1813. Likewise one Negro boy named Charles and one bed and furnature, also one large pot and blacksmith's tools.

Fifthly, I do give and grant unto my son Aaron Cone the following tracts or parcels of land viz. the first tract granted originally to Rheuben Bynam (then Effingham County but now Bulloch) for two hundred acres. The grant is dated the 31st of December 1784 and deeded by said Bynam to Asael Farmer and his deed is lost, and deeded from said Farmer to me, his deed is dated the 26th of April 1799. The second tract granted to Valentine Hollingsworth (then Effingham County but now Bulloch) for two hundred acres, the grant is dated the 16th of November 1793, by said Hollingsworth deeded to Elizabeth Ryall. Mrs. Ryall's heirs deeded it to me. The third tract granted originally to John Goldsmith (then Effingham County but now Bulloch) for three hundred acres, the grant is dated the 10th November 1795 on the tract my house now stands. Said Goldsmith deeded it to me. The deed is dated the 16th of March 1796. The fourth tract granted originally to John Caswell (then Effingham County but now Bulloch) for one hundred seventy nine acres, the grant is dated the 10th of November 1795 and deeded by said Caswell to John Goldsmith. The fifth tract granted to myself for two hundred acres of land, the grant is dated the 9th of November 1799. The sixth tract granted to myself for fifty acres of land, the grant is dated the 30th of October 1801. The seventh tract granted to myself for four hundred acres of land, the grant is dated the 14th of October 1813. The eighth tract also granted to myself for fifty acres of land, the grant is dated the 16th of November 1813. Likewise one Negro boy named Amos and one bed and furnature, also one rifle gun, also one musket gun.

Sixthly, I do give unto my grandson John Goodman one bed and furnature.

Seventhly, I do give and grant unto my grandsons Joseph Cone and William Cone, jointly, the following tracts or parcels of land viz. the first tract granted originally to Nathaniel Lunday (then Effingham but now Bulloch County) for two hundred acres of land, the grant is dated the 22nd of February 1794. The second tract granted originally to William Pool for five hundred acres of land being only that part of the land that lies north of Cany Branch, the grant is dated the 19th of March 1795, then Effingham County but now Bulloch. The third tract granted to Matthew Carter of one hundred and fifty acres of land, the grant is dated the 19th of March 1795, then Effingham County but now Bulloch. The fourth tract granted to Matthew Carter for one hundred acres of land, the grant is dated the 10th of May 1798, then and now Bulloch County. Likewise one Negro boy named Ezekiel, also each one of them one bed a piece. The land and Negro boy Ezekiel which I have given to my grandsons Joseph Cone and William Cone are to be kept for the use of my family until William Cone becomes twenty one years of age for I do not want to have my little grandsons to pay for their board. I wish my grandsons John Goodman, Joseph Cone and William Cone to sent to school whenever a school is within reach from July until March in every year and their tuition paid out of the family funds as long as it does last. Afterward out of their own property.

Eighthly, I give and grant unto my daughter Sarah Goodman one Negro girl named Lindy and her bed and furnature.

Ninthly, I do give and grant unto my daughter Ann Jones two Negro girls named Polly and Sharlotte. She has had her bed and furnature.

Tenthly, I do give and grant unto my daughter Keziah Sheffield two Negro girls named Zilpha and Amy. She has had her bed and furnature.

Eleventhly, I do give and grant unto my daughter Frances Cone two Negro girls named Phebe and Eliza and her bed and furnature.

Twelvthly, I do give and grant unto my daughter Susannah Cone two Negro girls named Lucy and Sarah and her bed and furnature. And I charge and direct my sons James Cone and Barber Cone to act as guardian for Susannah Cone, John Goodman, Joseph Cone, and William Cone until they come of age or do choose their own guardians.

My stock of cattle are to remain on the plantation for the use of my family except thirteen cows and calves for Joseph Cone and William Cone jointly next spring, and to John Goodman ten cows and calves next spring, also ten cows and calves and five cows and yearlings to my beloved wife Hannah Cone next spring and also to her ten steers of this description: four three year old steers and six two year old steers.

First I want to have so many of my steers sold as will pay my debts and the remainder of the steers from two years old and upwards to be left for the use of my family. The balance of my stock of cattle to be divided as follows: first to Sarah Goodman, secondly to Barber Cone, third to Frances Cone, fourth to Aaron Cone, fifthly to Susannah Cone. To each one of those five last mentioned persons six cows and calves a piece, the remainder of my she cattle and sucklings to be equally divided between my following children: Sarah Goodman, A. Jones, Barber Cone, Kezia Sheffield, Aaron Cone, Susannah Cone, Robert Cone is to have a beef every year and Barber Cone is to have a beef every year after he leaves the family out of the stock left for my family. The balance of the steers are not to be made use of only as the necessities of the family calls for them. I leave my stock of hogs, sheep, goats, bee-hives and crops for the careful use of my family. Also my horse, mule and oxen, my horse Fed and my wife's saddle, her bed and furnature I give to my beloved wife Hannah Cone. Also I leave a sugar mill, two carts, handmill, plantation tools, household and kitchen furnature are all to be left for the use of my family. Also it is my wish that my daughter Sarah Goodman to have the management and control of everything about the house except my wife's room. She is to have the privilege of that. Also it is my wish for Barber Cone to have the management and control of everything on the plantation as long as he lives with the family. When Barber leaves the family the management and control of the plantation will fall on Aaron Cone. I leave my Negro man Dick and Mary his wife are to work for my family until my grandson William Cone arrives at the age of twenty one years. After then I do intend that they (my Negro man Dick and Mary his wife) shall belong to my son Aaron Cone, likewise the houshold and kitchen furnature to belong to my son Aaron Cone. I wish my son Barber Cone to pay to Mr. George Mikell five dollars - I have paid to him all but the five dollars for finishing the woodwork of a wagon, and when it is finished for Barber Cone to iron it off, afterwards to sell it and to take his pay for the work he does to it out of the money which he gets for it. The overplus of the money to go to the use of my family. I wish my son Barber Cone to sell my mill irons and still to appropriate the money which they fetch for the use of my family. My daughter Sarah Goodman is to have the command of every thing about the house excepts she gets married. My son Aaron Cone must, after Barber leaves the place, try to make support for the family with the hands that are left on the plantation unless he does marry. If he does he is to have the privilege of the little room, and a sufficient quantity of land to tend together with an equal part of the cow-penned land. Also he is to have my mark and brand. If my beloved wife cannot stay with the family I want her to have the sixth part of my stock of cattle left for the support of my family.

I do appoint James Cone, Allen Jones, and Barber Cone my lawful Executors to have full power over my estate so as to carry my will into complete effect.

In witness herewith I have set my hand and seal in presence of us.

In the name of God, Amen, I, Samuel Slater, a citizen of State of Georgia and a Resident of the County of Bulloch, being weak in body, but of a sound dispensing mind and memory and knowing the certainty of Death and the uncertainty of life and rushing to dispose of such worldly treasures as it has pleased God to give and bless me with in this world, I therefore establish this? My Last Will and Testament revoking all other? and Establish this as My Last.

Item 1 I desire that after my death that my body be buried in a decent plain Christian Like manner at the desire of my Friends and Relative.

Item 2 I desire that all my just debts be paid out of my Wife's and my Son, Robert's, parts of my Estate by my Executors, which I will hereafter name.

Item 3 I give and bequeath unto my Dear Wife, Elizabeth, the Land and plantation on which I now live, and three hundred acres more was surveyed for Andrew Seckinger which? was forty acres take off the North? said survey; also all my plantation tools and Blacksmith and working tools; also all my household and kitchen furnature; also my chestnut sorrel mare and old Fan and my young? called Texas and my Bay Mare Called? My dourle barrel shot gun and my negro woman names Fanny and my negro boys? (possible the name Smart) and one bead, beadstead and two mattresses and there furnature also my? cattle except four cows and there calves, which I will hereafter mention; also all Hoggs and Sheep during her Life Time and after her death to my son, Robert B. Slater.

Item 4 I give to my Daughter, Martha Gieger and to her children, my negro woman named Rachael.

Item 5 I give to my Daughter Eliza Dasher and to her children two hundred acres of land lying on Mill Creek, known as the land surveyed for David Goodman?, and my negro girl named Rhoda.

Item 6 I give unto my son, William Slater, five dollars and one bead, which he has now in his possession. I also give to his wife, Ann Slater and her children, that she may have by my son William three hundred acres of land which I have already made her a deed to.

Item 7 I give unto my Daughter Sarah Waters, and her children five hundred and thrity-five acres of land bounded on the south by Higdons land and West by Scarboroughs land and my negro girl names Moriah and one bead which she has in her possession.

Item 8 I give unto my son? Slater, my negro boy? (may be the name Handy), but said boy must remain on the plantation with my wife during her life and five hundred acres of land which he has a deed to, and one bead.

Item 9 I give unto my Daughter Margaret Frances Slater and to her children, one tract of land containing one hundred and eighty-four acres, known as the land surveyed for Andrew Seckinger and one bead and my negro boy named Tom, and said boy to remain on the plantation during my wife's life.

Item 10 I give unto my Daughter, Jane Elizabeth Slater, and to her children two hundred and fifty acres of land known as the John (?) Driggers Land and one bead and my negro girl Hannah.

Item 11 I give unto my Daughter Hassett E. ? Slater and her children three hundred acres of land more or less bounded by Wilston and ? Land and one bead and my negro boy named Harry, but said boy to remain on the plantation during my wife's life.

Item 12 I give unto my son John. G. Slater two hundred acres of land more or less adjoining lands of John Mikile (?) and one bed and my rifles, gou and my negro girl named ? and four cows and their calves, and of my stock of cattle mentioned in the 3rd Item.

Item 13 I constite(?) and appoint my son ? guardian of my three young children, Liz Jane, John and Robert.

Item 14 I constitute and appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth Executrix and my son? and my? son-in-law Thomas Dasher, executors to this my Last Will and Testament. This December fifteenth in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

William was born circa 1745 at Ireland.1 He was the son of "Progenitor" Brannen <p113.htm>. He married Elizabeth (--?--) <p8.htm>, , circa 1786. William died circa 1840 at Bulloch Co., Georgia.2 His body was buried at Lower Lotts Creek Church, Bulloch Co., Georgia.

Biography of William Brannen:

We believe William Brannen was born in Ireland. This is based on the 1880 Census record of his daughter Cyrene Brannen (1802-1881) who is the only one of his children that lived until 1880 and that we were able to forward trace to 1880. In that Census record Cyrene clearly indicates her father was born in Ireland and her mother was born in North Carolina. [1880 Elmore Co. AL U. S. Federal Census - Five Points Beat 12, ED. 71, page 7 (84D), family 37, Family of Christopher Powell]

The earliest record we have found of William Brannen is a headright granting William Brannon 100 acres in Burke County, Georgia in 1790. [Lucas - Index to Headright and Bounty Grants of Georgia 1756-1909 Revised Ed. p. 63]. This suggests that William was in present day Screven County by 1789. There are about half a dozen deeds involving William Brannen, buying or selling land in Screven County between 1794 and 1805.

An interesting deed is one dated 17 October 1796 where in William Brannen sold to Hardy Everette for \$450, 450 acres, part of 950 acres on Little Ogeechee, bounded s. by vacant Stewart land, w. by vacant land, n. by vacant Temples and Fulgham, e. by Tumblin land, originally granted to Philip Dell, conveyed to William Black, to Robert Black, then to William Brannen. The deed was signed by William Brannen and wife, Elizabeth Brannen. Recorded 30 March 1808. [Screven Co. GA DB A-471] This deed suggests that William Brannen owned land in the area around the Little Ogeechee River in present day Hancock and Washington Counties, probably not too distant from present day Hamburg State Park. It is not clear when or even if he lived on that land. We did find where Phillip Dell was granted 500 acres in two lots in St. George Parish in 1770. This may well be part of that land although technically that area was west of the Ogeechee River and not in St. George Parish. The area around the Little Ogeechee River was Indian land until it became the original Washington County in 1784. One wonders when William acquired that land and under what circumstances he would be involved in an area so far removed from Screven County.

It appears that William Brannen and family lived in Screven County from the earlly 1790's until 1814. William and Elizabeth Brannen's name first appear in Bulloch County as members of the Nevils Creek Baptist Church as recorded in the 1814 minutes. They also appear in the 1815 minutes but are not listed in the 1817 minutes. [Register - Bulloch County, Georgia Genealogical Source Material, p. 419] William also is a witness to a Stanford to Hodges Deed on 10 Sep 1814. [Register - Bulloch County, Georgia Genealogical Source Material, p. 51]

William Brannen, his wife and young children appear to have moved to Jasper County Georgia in the early 1820's. William's last deeds in Bulloch County are dated 1818 and his daughter, Mary marries John Allen on 6 April 1819 in Jasper Co. Georgia. William and his family are enumerated in the 1820 Census of Bulloch Co. Georgia as follows:

William Brannen is listed as Head of Family age 45+. There is 1male age 16-45 (John) 2 males age 10-15 (Hugh & Edmund) 4 males age <10. (possible grandchildren), 1 female age 16-45 (Elizabeth) 3 females 10-16 (Lucretia, Cyrene, Rhoda) (1820 U. S. Federal Census for Bulloch Co. GA. p. 15). Sons Solomon, William and Thomas Alexander and families are enumerated nearby. There are no foreigners not naturalized indicated and no slave or free colored enumerated. This suggests that Elizabeth, wife of William, was born around 1775. (1820 U. S. Federal Census for Bulloch Co. GA. p. 15).

William and Elizabeth are no doubt in Jasper Co. Georgia from before 1825 to after 1831 as daughters Cyrene and Lucretia marry there in 1825 and 1827. Son Hugh C. Brannen also marries there in August of 1831. On 1 Dec 1829 William executed the following instrument in Jasper County, Georgia:

"Know all men by these presents that for the love and affection which I have towards my beloved daughter, Rhodah Brannen, I have this day given to my said daughter, Rhodah the land whereon I am living containing 100 acres. All my household furniture, stock of any kind with all dues and demands which may be owing, all the above property to ge given in fee simple, at the death of myself and my lawful wife, Elizabeth Brannen." Signed: William Brannen Wit: Judith Hancock, William Hancock, Recd.: 1 Dec 1829. [Jasper Co. GA DB B-246]

The 1830 Jasper Co. Georgia Census shows a William Braner as head of household as follows: Wm. Braner HH 1male 80-90 (William), 1 male 20-30 (Hugh C.), 1 female 20-30 (unknown), 1 female 50-60 (Elizabeth) [1830 Census of Jasper Co. Georgia, p. 378] This Wm. Braner is clearly William Brannen and his wife, Elizabeth, unmarried son Hugh C. and an unknown female, age 20-30. By 1830 all his four younger daughters who would be age 20-30 in 1830, Mary, Lucrecia, Cyrene, and Rhoda are all married and enumerated in the 1830 Census. Mary is living in Bulloch Co. Georgia with her husband, John Allen. Lucrecia, Cyrene and Rhoda are living near William and Elizabeth in Jasper County with their husbands, Henry Smith, C. W. Powell and William Moore respectively. Hugh is unmarried in 1830 and is likely the male age 20-30 in the 1830 census. It is possible that the unknown female age 20-30 is Rhoda as in 1829, William deeded his land to Rhoda. She may have been enumerated twice that year. Once with her husband and once with her parents on land that she technically owned. This clearly suggests that William was born between 1740 and 1750. Based on this census record we show his date of birth as circa 1745.

In the Lower Lotts Creek Church in Bulloch County, Georgia minutes for March 1833 William Brannen is listed as a Male Member with the notation "dismissed by letter". William Brannen Jr. and Solomon Brannen are also listed in these minutes with the same notations. John and Edmund Brannen names are on the list also, however, without notation. [Register - Bulloch County, Georgia Genealogical Source Material, p. 422-3] This suggests that William Brannen returned to Bulloch County before 1833. The minutes from Lower Lotts Creek Church also show William Brannen as "Recieved by letter; Deceased" and Elizabeth Brannen as "Dismissed by letter" and "Deceased". It is not clear when these entries were made but they appear to have been made between March 1833 and February 1841. The William noted as deceased is very likely William Brannen (1745) as his son, William Brannen (1795) did not die until May 1841, after this notation would have been made. Thus these deceased entries in the Church minutes very likely refer to William Brannen (1745) and his wife Elizabeth. Other researchers indicate he did return to Bulloch County and lived with his son John until he died about 1840 and that he and his wife are buried at Lower Lotts Creek Church Cemetery, although there is no grave marker.

Robert Donaldson's 1844 Letter to His Son-in-law, Thomas Brannen

(The following preface and letter were reprinted on pages 42-44 of Dorothy Brannen's book "Life in Old Bulloch" (Statesville, Ga.: Statesboro Regional Library, 1992).)

Robert was the son of John Donaldson, a Scotsman who came to America from Northern Ireland in 1774. Robert could remember crossing the ocean when he was five years old. He became a Primitive Baptist preacher and established eight churches of that faith in Bulloch County. Following is a letter that Robert wrote to Thomas Brannen, who had married his daughter Nancy. Thomas and Nancy emigrated to Florida with a party that included her sister Susannah, who had married Owen Williams.)

Feb. 12th, 1844.

Dear Son,

This is my design in taking my pen to inform you of our troubles in these enterposing days of adversity while in our pilgrimage here below.

I do expect you have heard of Franklin's death that took place the 26th of December. He was married the 13th of the month to Susanna Johnson from Augusta. He was taken very poorly a fortnight before he was married and was not able to sit up that day, barely able to stand while they were married. They came home on the Sabbath after, and got worse and we sent for a doctor hastily from Carolina. Our Doctor Ross was gone to Florida. I would not give Ross for all the doctors, not for any under heaven, though none can baffle death very long.

Dear son, are you prepared to die? If so, very well, if not, very ill for you should you be called to go this

night before the clock strikes one. Franklin stayed till fifteen minutes after four, and then took the journey to a dark gloomy shade that's called the region of the shadow of death that you and I must try before long; that is, "The wages of sin is death."

I suppose that you heard that Matthew was married to Elizabeth Hodges; this was on Thursday before the Fourth Sunday in September. They lived a little over the hill from my field toward John Allen's. Patsy and Elsie's living near Daniel Hendrix's old place, they are both baptised and getting along; they have bought on the railroad where Mills did live; they have negroes (five). Sallie and Elisha Banks live near Robert Cone's and are getting up slow but sure. Betsy and John Brannen live where James did live on the Burkhalter's Road. James' widow and eight children, six boys and two daughters, live near Garrett Williams' on Lott's Creek and is getting along well. Rebecca and Joseph Olliff are on the Court House Road three miles from the court house; they live plentifully. I heard from Solomon Ralston; he is in Louisiana state in September and doing well and hearty. Solomon left Mary with me; she is a great child to her age, 13, weighs 110. Rebecca has eight children; boys five, girls three Betsy has nine, five boys, girls four; Sally has four; three boys, girls one. Patsy has two daughters, born beauties; but all of these have to die.

JOSEPH STEBBINS NORTON. For a period of nearly forty years Mr. Norton was continuously identified with the business enterprise of Boston, in Thomas county, and while acquiring ample material prosperity has also rendered much useful service to his community as a citizen. He represented old and prominent families in Georgia and South Carolina, and many of his forefathers and relatives were men of mark in the profession and in business and civic affairs.

Joseph Stebbins Norton was born at Robertsville in the Beaufort district of South Carolina on the 31st of August, 1851. The founder of this branch of the Norton family in America was the Rev. Jonathan Norton, great-grandfather of the Boston business man. A native of England, he came to America during colonial times, settling at Hilton Head Island, South Carolina. He was a minister of the Baptist church and was pastor of the church at St. Helena. Island and elsewhere in South Carolina.

Robert Godfrey Norton, the grandfather, was born at Bluffton in the Beaufort district, and became a prosperous planter in that vicinity. He also was honored with places of trust in the community, serving as sheriff and ordinary of the district for several years, and during his early life gave service to the united colonies as a revolutionary soldier. He was a lifelong resident of the Beaufort district. The maiden name of his wife was Sarah Morse. Her father, Dr. George Morse, who was throughout his life a resident of Beaufort district, was both a practicing physician and a minister of the Baptist church. Robert G. Norton and wife were blessed with long years and they celebrated the golden anniversary of their wedding day.

Alexander R. Norton, the father, was born on a plantation on the May river in Beaufort district, September 2, 1812. After his early training in the common schools he was graduated from the Charleston Medical College and later from the Savannah Medical College. His entire professional career was spent in Robertsville, South Carolina, where he gave arduous and unselfish service to a large circle of patients throughout many years. His death occurred at the age of seventy-five. (War record) Dr. Norton married Julia Elizabeth Greene, who was born in Screven county, Georgia, in 1817. Her father, John Greene, was also an active member of the medical profession, was a native Georgian, and in addition to- his practice conducted a large plantation. It is also noteworthy that he was a pioneer in transportation business on the Savannah river, owning the first "pole boat" that plied between Savannah and up-river ports. Both Dr. Greene and wife are buried in the Buck churchyard on Brier creek, Screven county, near their old plantation home. Julia (Greene) Norton, the mother, died in her sixty-fourth year, and her seven children were named as follows: William B., John G., Robert G. Jr., Alexander C., Mary Eugenia, Susan Tallulah and Joseph S.

Joseph S. Norton, reared in one of the cultured homes of the south, received a good education, attending school in his native state and in Savannah, where the family lived during two years of the war. He began his business career with his brother at Stockton in Clinch county, and from there came to Boston in 1874. At that time Boston was a mere hamlet, and he was one of the first men of commercial enterprise to locate here, and was an important factor in the subsequent development of the town. He opened a store with, a stock of general merchandise, and kept building and broadening his trade constantly for nearly forty years. He was at the head of the Norton Mercantile Company. For some time also he was engaged in sawmilling, and conducted one of the good farms in this vicinity.

Mr. Norton was married December 3d, 1874, to Miss Ella May Grovenstein. She

was born in Effingham county, this state, a daughter of Benjamin and Emma (Metzger) Grovenstein. Both her parents were natives of Georgia, and their ancestry, goes back to the original German stock that along with the Scotch-Irish and English composed the first Georgia colony, the Grovensteins and Metzgers having come in with the Salzbergers. Mr. and Mrs. Norton became the parents of ten children, named as follows: Binney A., Frederick S., Emma Augusta, Edward Judson, Bessie May, Hugh Grovenstein, Katie Eugenia, Josie Maude, Ruby Tallulah and Martha Louise.

Mr. Norton was a member of the Missionary Baptist church, as is his wife, he having served as clerk of the board. Fraternally he affiliated with Horeb Lodge No. 281, F. & A. M., and J. M. Rushin Chapter, R. A. M. In politics he was a Democrat, and for a time served as mayor of his home town of Boston. He died July 9, 1912.

She never Can come to us it is very sickly about her with the feverage and other fevours our family at preasent is all well through God's Blessing. It will Be a great mercy if we Can Say So Long I thought it would I Should griev my Self So it would kill me and I thought I Should not Desire to Live any longer than Mamma But such thoughts is rong we must say god's will Be Done that was all. that Comfort I had a moving up here to think mamma was here But now she is gone when I was Below I had aunt Sarah for a mamma and now I have none and no Sister that I ever think of Seeing in the world I have Enough to wean me from it. Theophilus Hanford is shown in a Pay Role for Captain Keeler's Company in Col. Philip P Bradley's regiment. Fairfield County, Connecticutt, Enlisted June 17, 1776 and was discharged Nov 16, 1776. Rank was Corporal.

General Notes: William Cone, Sr. returned to Bulloch some time between 1812 and 1816, and it was there on June 24, 1816, he deeded all his property to his son, Aaron Cone. The deed of gift, recorded in deed book 4A, p. 311, Bulloch, conveyed 1,000 acres of land in Bulloch; one half interest in 350 acres in Glynn County granted him and John Hagin (Vol.1); seven slaves, one horse, all his household goods, crop plantation tools, rifle and all money on hand or due him. This apparently was made about the time or during the last illness of the old patriot as he was dead before the following October term of Camden Court.

William Cone, Sr. was a representative from Glynn County in 1804 and shortly thereafter moved to Camden. He was appointed Justice of Peace in the 35th district of Camden in 1806 but resigned in 1808 and was succeeded by his son, William Cone, Jr., Feb. 25, 1808.

#### Notes for JOHN HAGIN:

According to a note found in the Bulloch County Library in a family file, there were five (5) Hagin Brothers, ancestors of the Hagin's of this country that came to the US (NC as far as is known) from Ireland

A Revolutionary War soldier, John moved to Georgia during the latter part of the war to Effingham County. In the formation of Bryan County out of Effingham County they were placed in the new county and in 1796 by a similar change were placed in Bullock County. Among the earliest settlers along the Ogeechee River were; Cones, Williamses, Laniers, Hagins, Hodges and Burkhalters.

Some evidence indicates that John may be the son of Edward Hagan of Pennsylvania. Edward's will names a second son as John and a younger son as Peter. Both John and Peter as well as other known siblings of Peter migration patterns are very similar as they travel close together usally in the same or adjoining counties in Florida and Georgia. Further research is ongoing.

Notes for JESSE HAGIN: Provided by Patricia C. Cone, The following was provided by Marcus Cone of Jacksonville Fl.: In 1794 the tax digest of Glynn County shows William Cone was located there. He had bought land along the Satilla River, near the community of Jefferson and went into the real estate business with Jesse Hagin. This man's name would be linked with his for years to come. They would jointly sign deeds and tax returns. Judging by the amount of land they bought and sold, it appears their association proved to be a profitable one. (Blair's Some Early Tax Digests of Georgia, Page 9) Captain Cone returned to his homestead along the Ogeechee in 1796, just before that part of Effingham County was cut into a new county. The new jurisdiction was Bulloch County. On November 28 1801, he sold 1000 acres of Bulloch County Property for \$1550 and returned to Glynn County. (Pioneers of Wiregrass Georgia, Vol. II, page 65) and (The Georgia Genealogical Magazine, Issue No. 36, Spring 1970, page 110). "Born in 1745, on the Pee Dee River in North Carolina, William Cone married Keziah Barber in 1765 and moved to Georgia as one of the earliest settlers of Bulloch County. That county was organized in 1796. There he actively participated and instigated acts against the Tories. He became a captain in the

American Revolution and served in McLean's Regiment of Georgia Troops and later under General Francis Marion. At the close of the Revolution, Captain Cone returned to the pursuits of peace near Ivanhoe and was foreman of the first grand jury raised in Bulloch County. Capt Cone died in 1816 near Ivanhoe, Ga."

Re: Colonial Families of the United States of America also Some Account of the Cone Family in America by William Whitney Cone

The name supposedly was changed from Mackhoe or MacKone when arriving in America. The reason for changing the family name as passed down through family stories is that the father of William escaped from Scotland after defending Bonnie Prince Charles at the Battle of Culloden. This battle was fought in 1745. The regiment was wiped out and the elder Cone fled to America. Since the British were in control in the colonies, he changed his name to remain undetected.

\*\*\*The following is reprinted from the 1872 profile on Georgia State Senator Joseph Smith Cone (1834-1910). Joseph is descended from William, Aaron, and James, his father. The profile on pages 15-17 in "A. St. Clair-Abrams' Manual and Biographical Register of the State of Georgia for 1871-1872: "Prior to the revolution of 1776, four brothers named Cone, came originally from Virginia and settled in Georgia. When the struggle for independence began, all of them entered the service of the young republic, and three fell upon the battlefield. The survivor, WILLIAM CONE, was a captain in the Continental army, and a most gallant officer, in recognition of whose distinguished services the State of Georgia presented him with a fine plantation in Bullock (sic) County. Here he resided until his death, at the advanced age of eighty years, a man of influence and popularity, and it is recorded on the legal records of his county as the foreman of the first grand jury which ever assembled therein." This same info was also given by Dr. Waldo Emerson Floyd, Jr. of Macon, GA. in 1996. He is a descendant of America Cone, great-granddaughter of William Cone.

Captain Cone was known as "The Fighting Parson". He was the first pastor of the Little Ogeechee Baptist Church at Oliver in Screven County in 1790. Since there was no bridge, he swam his horse across to the church.

Inventory of estate of William Cone made by Aaron Cone on March 4, 1823 and recorded May 24, 1823 in Bulloch County, Ga in Book 1A pages 128-129. Another inventory made on Feb. 16, 1824 and recorded July 20, 1824 in Book 1A pages 138-140.

Florida Society of the American Revolution states "William Cone in 1781 drove a group of Tories from Cow Ford in Florida back into Florida. But then William Cone, William Williams and two other men were captured and imprisoned at the Fort in St. Augustine. They were Captured by the British. In 1783, William and his men escaped." It also identifies William as being of the Richmond County Militia and having lived from 1745 to 1815.

William Norton (1744-1800) served as lieutenant in the South Carolina Continental Troops. He was born in England; died in Bluffton, SC. William Edwards enlisted, 1775, as a private in Capt. J. Elliots company, Col. Charles C. Pinckney's Regiment; 1779, in Capt. William Caldwell's company, 3rd South Carolina Regiment, and served until 1781. He died, 1833, in Effingham County, GA. William Cone served as Private in McLean's regiment, Georgia State Troops. Pioneers of Wiregrass Georgia, Volume 5, Huxford:

William Cone, R.S. married Keziah Barber who was the sister of Casandra Barber. It is believed that Casandra Barber and her husband Mathew Carter moved to Mississippi. William, R.S. served in the Revolutionary War as Major, 1st. Battalion, Richmond County militia. In 1779 he moved to Cheraw District of South Carolina and later to Effingham County, Ga. On Feb. 28, 1784 he was granted 250 acres of bounty land in Washington County, Ga (see p. 48, Knight's Roster of the Revolution in Georgia). He died in 1822 and was buried in the Cone Cemetary in Bulloch County, Ga.

Corrections, Volume 5, Huxford (p. 544):

Cone, William, Sr. (pp.64-66 Volume 2)

In doing research in the Minutes of Camden Superior Court within the last three or four years, the compiler has ascertained that he married a second time - a fact never mentioned and evidently not known by any of the Cone family historians. In deed book "I", p.13 of Camden County, is the record of a separation agreement dated Jan. 8, 1812, between William Cone and his wife martha, in which it was agreed that thereafter each should hold his and her own property free from any claim on the part of the other "as though never married". The Minutes show that the same year William Sr., filed suit for divorce against his wife, Martha Cone. The original papers in the suit having been lost, it cannot be learned when they married or what her maiden name was or where married or the grounds for divorce - matters usually set forth in divorce proceedings. The Court dockets show the case was continued from term to term from 1812 until the october 1816 term when the docket shows the case was dismissed, it being stated that "suit was abated by the death of the plaintiff."

William Cone, Sr. returned to Bulloch some time between 1812 and 1816, and it was there on June 24, 1816, he deeded all his property to his son, Aaron Cone. The deed of gift, recorded in deed book 4A, p. 311, Bulloch, conveyed 1,000 acres of land in Bulloch; one half interest in 350 acres in Glynn County granted him and John Hagin (Vol.1); seven slaves, one horse, all his household goods, crop plantation tools, rifle and all money on hand or due him. This apparently was made about the time or during the last illness of the old patriot as he was dead before the following October term of Camden Court.

William Cone, Sr. was a representative from Glynn County in 1804 and shortly thereafter moved to Camden. He was appointed Justice of Peace in the 35th district of Camden in 1806 but resigned in 1808 and was succeeded by his son, William Cone, Jr., Feb. 25, 1808.

William Cone, Sr. was drawn to serve as a grand juror at the October Term, 1809, of Camden Superior Court, but was excused from duty on account of being over 60 years of age as shown by the court minutes.

The year of his death as published in Vol. II should be changed from 1822 to 1816. The 1822 date had been arrived at from the circumstance that his son Aaron had been appointed administrator of his estate on January 6, 1823.

### D. A. R.'S UNVEIL MARKER FOR CONE

Exercises Saturday at Revolutionary Hero's Grave in Bulloch County, Ga. Captain William Cone's resting place to be marked.

Statesboro, Ga. March 12. The Briar Creek Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution will unveil a marker at the grave of Captain William Cone, Revolutionary Hero, in Cone Cemetary at Ivanhoe, Saturday, March 13. At this time Honorable M. E. Wilson of Savannah, will be the principal speaker.

The D.A.R.'s are planning to place the several markers in this section of the state to Revolutionary heroes and expect to hold their second unveiling shortly after the Cone program on Saturday. Captain William Cone, a native of North Carolina, settled in this section of Georgia before the outbreak of the Revolution and was an officer whose name is linked with many brave exploits against the Tories. The Tories used Bulloch County as a retreat, coming up from Florida through the Okefenokee Swamp. Captain Cone gathered together a party of men from this section, drove the Tories back into Florida and warned them to keep out of this community, which they did. Many people have oftened wondered why this section and particularly Bulloch County was late in being settled. The settlers did not care to come to a section that was used as a hiding place for the Tories and it is due to the brave exploits of Captain Cone that Bulloch County came to be settled and afterwards densely populated.

William Cone was living in Bulloch when the county was organized. The extracts from the minutes of the first court ever held in this county read as follows: "At a Superior Court began and held at the house of Stephen Mills, in and for the County of Bulloch on Tuesday the 16th day of May, 1737, the Honorable William Stephens, Esq., one of the Judges of the Superior court of the State of Georgia, presiding. The Court opened in due form and proceeded to the organization of the same by calling the grand and petit jurors. The Grand Jury presented william Cone as their foreman. Captain Cone's grandson, General Peter Cone, served continuously in the legislature of Georgia for 30 years and was the most dominant figure in the County until the time of his death. At the outbreak of the Civil War he was a Major General in the state militia. William Cone, jr., another grandson, became a Captain in the War of 1812 after which he settled in Florida, went to the legislature and fought against the Seminoles. Captain William Cone, grandson of the old Captain, had a large part in one of the most remarkable feats ever recorded in the War of 1812. Captain Cone commanded 20-8 men who caused 23 British barges to retreat when entering the St. Marys River in 1815. Though the ships fired large cannons, the palmetto on either side of the river served as a screen for Cone's men who in this manner harrasssed the British causing them to retrace their course.

William Cone's name was also a familiar one in the religious of the time. In the record of the Hephsibah Baptist Centennial from 1794 to 1834 this appears: "William Cone is first brought to our attention in 1792 as pastor of Little Ogeechee Church in Screven County and its messenger to the Georgia Association. The tradition speaks of him as the instrument in God's hands of building up the Baptist church in the above-named county, also in the counties of Bulloch and Tattnall. His name is a familiar one for many miles around Ogeechee Church."

Provided by Patricia C. Cone, The following was provided by Marcus Cone of Jacksonville Fl.: In 1794 the tax digest of Glynn County shows William Cone was located there. He had bought land along the Satilla River, near the community of Jefferson and went into the real estate business with Jesse Hagin. This man's name would be linked with his for years to come. They would jointly sign deeds and tax returns. Judging by the amount of land they bought and sold, it appears their association proved to be a profitable one. (Blair's Some Early Tax Digests of Georgia, Page 9) Captain Cone returned to his

homestead along the Ogeechee in 1796, just before that part of Effingham County was cut into a new

county. The new jurisdiction was Bulloch County. On November 28 1801, he sold 1000 acres of Bulloch County Property for \$1550 and returned to Glynn County. (Pioneers of Wiregrass Georgia, Vol. II, page 65) and (The Georgia Genealogical Magazine, Issue No. 36, Spring 1970, page 110). Note: The 1000 acres he sold is the sum of property in the Land Grants dated 1785, 1788, 1786, 1793<sup>3</sup>

General Notes: Very little is known about this fifteen year old bride. Her father was William Barber who, like her husband, was destined to fight in the Revolution. She had a sister named Cassandra who was married to a man named Matthew Carter. The families of Cone and Carter apparently felt a close kinship towards each other for they traveled together to South Carolina's Cheraw District in 1779, resided there for a few years, then moved on to Georgia's Effingham County. The Carters parted company in 1811 when they left for Mississippi. Perhaps this was due to the death of Keziah.

Keziah Eudel Barber Cone was born about 1750 in the Pee Dee Station area of North Carolina. She was the daughter of William Nathaniel Barber and Hepzibah Loomis Barber and sister of Cassandra Barber Carter. Some of her ancestors were said to have come to America aboard the Mayflower. About 1765 at the Pee Dee Station in North Carolina, Keziah married William Henry Cone, a farmer, landowner, justice of the peace, and Baptist minister, who became a Revolutionary War hero known as the "Fighting Parson" (while fighting with Francis Marion, the "Swamp Fox," of South Carolina). Keziah and William became residents of Cheraw County, South Carolina before migrating to Effingham County, Georgia and later to Bulloch County. They had nine children: Aaron Cone, Sr., Jane E. Cone, William Cone, Jr., Joseph Cone, Keziah Cone Dampier, Sarah Cone Knight, Nancy Cone Hagin, Mary Cone Lee, and Elizabeth Cone. Keziah and William resided in the Ivanhoe Voting District of Bulloch County, Georgia. Preceding her husband in death, Keziah died in 1810 in Bulloch County and was buried in the Old William Cone-Barber Family Cemetery (Captain William Cone Cemetery) adjacent to the old Barber family homestead on the east side of the Old River Road near the Stagecoach Road on the western bank of the Ogeechee River south of Georgia Highway 119 (Guyton-Stilson Road). In 1985 a bridge across the Ogeechee River linking Bulloch and Effingham Counties was named in honor of her husband. Among her many notable descendents was a son, Aaron Cone, Sr., who was a courier during the American Revolution; a son, William Cone, Jr., who served in both the Georgia and Florida legislatures; a grandson, Aaron Cone, Jr., who assisted naturalist John Abbot in exploring Bulloch County; a grandson, William Haddock Cone, who was a Confederate veteran and a Florida state senator; a grandson Peter Cone who was a Major General in the Confederacy; a grandson Daniel Newman Cone who was a law enforcement officer killed in the line of duty; great-grandsons, Paul Robert Cone and John Slater Cone, Confederate soldiers who died from wounds received at the battle at James Island, South Carolina in June 1862; a great-grandson, Fredrick Preston Cone, Governor of Florida from 1937 to 1942; a great-grandson Aaron Donaldson Cone, a Confederate veteran; a great-grandson Joseph Smith Cone, a Lt. The Village of Marlow -- Settled in 1833. The area was settled in the year 1833 by a family of MARLOWs, the town later being given that name by Mr. CUYLER, first president of the Central of Georgia Railway. In honor of this first family, Mr. MARLOW laid the property in lots and streets, many of which are still used today. Upon laying out the town, he proceeded to sell lots. The first church to be erected in the town was a Presbyterian Church. Leaders in this church were Dr. W. F. MCCONNELL, Laurie MCNEAL, and Ed PURSE, all of whom had built fine homes in the town. Another early settler by the name of WHITE built the home that is now the home of Mr. and Mrs. Osburn N. MINGLEDORFF. Apparently most of the townfolk who were of the Presbyterian faith either died or moved away as after some years the church bevcame the meeting place for any denomination that desired to meet there. Later the building was used as a school. Rooms were added tot he original building when Zion and Sand Hill Schools were consolidated with Marlow. A Methodist CHurch was then built in the community. Today is is the only church there. Mt. Olive Lutheran CHurch was built about 1919 coming from the original Mt. Olive in Oliver, Georgia. The properties of the church were moved to Marlow. This chuch was merged with Zion in 1952. A Post Office operated in Marlow for more than 100 years and served the the area to Chatham County with rural delivery until Jan 1, 1958 when the rural routes were moved to the Guyton Post Office. The local Post Office still serves the residents of Marlow. Probably the oldest house is occupied by A. B. Zittrauer and Mr. and Mrs. Lee Grovenstein. This house was built for a Mr. EDWARDS who came from Ebenezer some time before 1850. The Zion Community, which is adjacent to Marlow, was settled in the main by people moving from Ebenezer because of malaria fever there. Among some of the old families to come to Zion from Ebenezer were the DASHERs and

FETZERs. The Zion Church center of the community was organized about 1850. It was a mission church of Ebenezer and was served by a mission pastor, Rev. Haltiwanger, from the Mother Church Ebenezer. The original building was burned by the Yankees during the Civil War. The present building was completed about 1870. The Zion School, the old building still stands on the church grounds, was built around 1855 by a Mr. Horace ZITTERAUER, who was later killed in the Civil War. School was held at the Zion School every year until it was consolidated with Marlow in 1925. The Marlow School now serves all of that end of the county and is a consolidation of the Pienora, Union, Spring Hill, Miller Chapel, Sand Hill, Eden, Meldrim, and Zion Schools.

Brannen is listed on Taylor County's first tax roll, that of 1857, and in 1859 had 10 slaves assessed against him but in the first roll I've seen since the war ended, 1868, his name does not appear, indicating that he had passed away before then." [Perry FL Newspaper articles by W. T. Cash. date and paper unknown but date is prior to 1961. W. T. Cash was born and raised in Taylor Co. Florida and was appointed as Florida's first state librarian. He wrote a series of columns in the 1920's about current trends and days gone by. This article appears to be a reprint of one of those columns.) Article goes on to state. "H. T. (who will be called Thomas hereafter) was married twice and that one son (possibly the only child of this union) was Frank Brannen. By another union there were two sons, Sam and Houston and possibly, other, I have never heard the names of either of Thomas Brannen's wives. Thomas Brannan, according to early tax rolls, like many another early settler did not own any land, but his home

After he died his father Ellison Gross, Solomon's son, raised his sons Gustavus Adolphus Gross, Reuben Presley, and Charles Monroe.

They were led by Solomon Gross. This mob was a part of the Regulator movement in NC and SC protesting the high taxes and crooked officials imposed upon them by the British Royal Governor. This was a prelude to the unrest which started the Revolution in 1775. (Apr 28 1768) A summary of the life of Solomon Gross from records found in NC and GA. It is obvious that he was an educated man for the time in which he lived and judging from his land purchases, land grants and land sales that he was a business man with a great acumen but probably not very profitable for he owned few slaves if any at all. He was a man of public service counting all the public offices he held in NC and GA.1797-1798.....Represented Screven Co in the Legislature1799.....Elected Justice of Peace 1800.....Elected Sheriff of Screven Co for a 2-year term.) was born Abt. 1740 in VA. He married (1) ESTHER. He married (2) MARY ERWIN Abt. 1764 in NC.

Even though the population in the western part of North Carolina was growing, their representation in state affairs was not on the same level as the more established eastern communities. They received few benefits from the government but they were still taxed for services that were enjoyed mainly by those in the east. The local offices were held by men who basically purchased the offices and saw those offices as a way of making money. Corruption was found at all levels of government. By 1765, the settlers of the western regions were at a breaking point. They wanted the right to "regulate" their local governments and end their unfair treatment so they began to form into groups known as the "Regulators". For three years they attempted to bring change peacefully but it became apparent to them that nobody was concerned about their situation.

On April 21, 1768, 40 armed men went to the Anson County court house and took it over to protest. They were calmed down and soon left but, a week later, about one hundred men returned. Stopping court proceedings, they considered tearing down the court house and the jail but finally decided to let the buildings stand and eventually dispersed. Samuel Spencer, of the Anson County court, wrote to Governor Tryon about the situation. The Governor responded by ordering Spencer to raise a militia to keep the peace and uphold the law but also suggested that the settlers send a petition concerning their concerns to him or to the General Assembley. A petition, which was signed by ninety-nine men including Andrew Fortinberry, John Fretinberry and Henry Frostinberry, was sent to the Governor who replied in a letter dated August 19, 1768.

One of the Regulator leaders, Solomon Gross, was later arrested on charges that the other Regulators felt were false. Having sworn to defend each other, some of the men went to the Anson County jail on February 27, 1769, and tore it down, freeing Gross. The Falconburys were part of that group and they were named in a group of 33 men for whom arrest warrants were issued.

WILLIAMSBURG, March 23.

We hear from North Carolina, that parties of men are dispersed all over the colony, apprehending suspected persons, and disarming all the Highlanders and regulators that were put to the route in the late battle. The conquerors have already taken 350 guns and shot bags, about 150 swords and dirks, 1500 excellent rifles, two medicine chests fresh from England, one of them valued at £300 sterling, in a box containing Half Johannesses and Guineas, secreted in a stable at Cross Creek, discovered by a negroe, and reported to be worth £15,000 sterling; also thirteen waggons, with complete setts of horses. Eight hundred and fifty common soldiers were made prisoners, disarmed, and discharged. Col. Long has also apprehended several of their officers who are now in Halifax goal, viz. Col. John Piles, Major Thomas Collins, Thomas Bradford, and William Bradford; Lieutenants Stephen Parker and Daniel McDonald, the latter wounded through the thigh; Ensign Downing, and Dr. Robertson York. There are in the same goal four persons of the name of Field, one Turner, and three Bells; a midshipman, and a quarter gunner of the Scorpion; likewise one Kingsborough McDonald, Colonels Hugh McDonald, Thomas Rutherford, Hector McNeal, and Alexander McDonald; Captains Morrison, McKenzie, Thomas Weir, Leggate, Solomon Gross, Parsons, McCoy, Muse, John Micheson, Neil McCarter, and Adjutant Fraser; Lieutenants Colin McIver, Joshua Hews, — Cameron, Donald Hews, Donald Cameron, and sundry other Lieutenants and Ensigns, whose names we have not an account of; Kenneth McDonald, aid de camp, James Hepburn secretary, Parson Beattie, Aaron Verdy, waggon master, and Dr. Morrison, Commissary. General McDonald and Brigadier General McLeod (the latter of whom was killed, and the other taken prisoner) set out at the head of this banditti, with the avowed intention of carrying Governor Martin to the interior parts of the province. These two officers passed through Newbern a few months ago, where they took a solemn oath, before the committee of that town, that their business in the province was only to see their friends and relations.

An act of the legislature passed February 1, 1797, authorized five citizens to select and purchase fifty acres on which to build a courthouse and jail. the five Commissioners chose a site on Beaver Dam Creek and Bought 50 acres from Solomon Gross. This site became the town of Jacksonboro, confirmed by the legislature as the county seat of Screven County February 16, 1799. The town was named for General James Jackson, who was governor of Georgia at the time.

On August 28, 1671, it was ordered that the petitioners should appear before the Governor and Council upon Saturday, September 9, peremptorily to prosecute the complaint against the defendants. When that day came, upon hearing the petition, both parties having referred themselves to the determination of the Governor and Council, it was decided that the said John Norton and Originall Jackson should have sixteen pieces of cedar timber desired and one piece of cedar timber more claimed by the defendants.

Abstract: Isaac and Rebecca Ellis, executors of the will of Rebecca's first husband, William T. Kirkland, ask the court to uphold their claim to two slaves in William's estate. In 1796 Richard Kirkland made a gift of two slaves to his two children, Edward and Tabitha Kirkland; he gave Edward a male slave named Buck and Tabitha a female slave named Lucy. Since both children predeceased Richard without having children, their brother, William, received the slaves by specific bequests in the wills of Edward and Richard Kirkland. At his death, William left "the whole of the remainder of his estate" to his widow, Rebecca. The Ellises complain, however, that Rebecca's children "immediately" took possession of the slaves in their father's estate and sold Buck, Lucy, and Lucy's "increase" without consulting them. The

petitioners claim that they are entitled "to at least one half of the aforesaid negro slaves if not to the whole." They seek a court decree compelling the children to account with them for the proceeds of the sale and the slaves' hire.

Will of George Norton - May 3, 1665

IN THE NAME OF GOD AMEN Ye third day of May in the year of our Lord God one thousand six hundred sixty and five and in the seventeenth year of the reign of Our Sovereign Lord Charles the Second by the Grace of God King of England &c.

I GEORGE NORTON of the town of St. Michaels in the Island of Barbados Merchant being sick in body but of sound and pfect mind and memory (praise be given unto Almighty God therefore) do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say: First and principally I commend my soul into the hands of Almighty God and my body to the earth from whence it came to be decently buried in Christian like manner according to the discretion of my Overseers hereafter mentioned and now for the settling of my temporal estates and such goods chattels and debts as it hath pleased God far above my deserts to bestow upon me I do order give and dispose of the same in manner and form following (that is to say)

First I will yt all these debts and duties as I owe in right or conscience to any maner of pson or psons whatsoever shall be well and truly contented and paid or ordained to be paid within convenient time after my decease by my Executors or Administrators hereafter named and after my said debts be discharged I will give and bequeath unto my well beloved friend Mrs. Thomas in Norris the sum or quantity of eight thousand pounds of good merchantable well cured dry musco sugar which I will shall be truly paid unto her or her order within six months after my decease in case she do in that time safely arrive in this Island of Barbados.

Item. I give and bequeath unto John Clarke a poor fatherless child which I have for some time past maintained and kept upon my own charge the sum or quantity of five thousand pounds of muscovado sugar which I will shall be paid unto him when he attain to the age of twenty years if he shall so long live to demand the same.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my servant Robert Hele the sum of four thousand pounds of musco sugar over and above what shall be to him justly due for sallery, and I will that the said sum or legacy of four thousand pounds of musco sugar be duely and truly paid unto him according to the true intent and meaning of this my pesent last will and Testament when and so soon as he shall have brought to execution all the selveable debts which to me are dur and owing from any pson or psons within this Island aforesaid at the cost and charges of my Executors or Administrators hereafter named to be defalked and allowed out of my estate.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my now servant Ann Stewart ye sum of five hundred pounds of musco sugar.

Item. I give and bequeath unto Phenix Tyler the sum of two hundred pounds of musco sugar. Item. I give and bequeath unto my loving brother Mr. John Norton of Killingworth in ye County of Warwick Gentl the sum of five pounds of currant English money.

Item. I give and bequeath to my sister Mrs. Mary Bayly now or late wife of Mr. Richard Bayly of Coleman Street within the City of London the sum of five pounds of Currant English money. Item. I give and bequeath unto my sister Hannah Walker now or late wife of Edward Walker Site Grinder the sum of thirty pounds of currant English money and my said legacies being paid and my funeral

expences discharged I will and ordain that he residue of all and singular my estate as well real as personal and all my leases messuages tenements goods chattels wares merchandizes and debts to me owing either in the Island aforesd. Or in the Realm of England and ready money shall be limited and reckoned in three equal parts and one equal third part whereof I give divise and bequeath unto my son John Norton one other third part thereof I give and bequeath unto my eldest daughter Mary Norton and the other third part thereof unto my daughter Hannah Norton pt. And part like between them in thirds equally to be divided and if it shall happen my said son John Norton to depart this life before he attain his full age of one and twenty years or before marriage then I will yt the part and portion so allotted to my said son as aforesaid shall be and remain to among my two daughters Mary and Hannah pt and pte like and if it shall happen either of my said daughters to depart this life before they attain their several ages of sixteen years being unmarried then I will and appoint yt the part and portion of her so dying shall be and remain to and amongst my son John and my surviving daughter pt and pt like or to the survivor of them.

Item. Whereas I have interest at Cape Faire as an adventurer to those parts in which affairs my said son John Norton is now employed as my Agent I will devise and bequeath unto my said son John Norton two equal third parts ( the whole in three parts to be divided) of all and singular my concerns there and the other third part thereof of my aforesaid two daughters Mary and Hannah or to the survivor of them if they or either of them (as aforesaid shall attain the age of sixteen years or day of marriage and if it should happen my said son to dye unmarried then I will and my meaning is that the whole shall come and be to my said two daughters or the survivor of them pt and pt like.

Item. I do hereby nominate ordain and appoint my said son John Norton to be sole and only Executor of this my last Will and Testament and overseers thereof my trusty and well beloved friends Collo. Richard Hawkins Mr. Henry Farney and Capt Anthony Lane all resident in the Island of Barbados aforesaid and I will and appoint yt the said Collo Richard Hawkins Mr. Henry Harney and Capt Anthony Lane shall be - administrators and have the administration of all and singular my leases goods chattels and debts to the use of my said son and daughters during their respective minorities or days of marriage as aforesaid and thereof shall be accomptable when they shall be thereunto legally required.

Item. I give and bequeath to every one of my said Overseers the sum or quantity of two thousand pounds of musco sugar apiece, for their pains in the premises to be taken, wherein I pray them to deal as becometh faithfull Christians as they will answer therefore before God and I do hereby revoke and make void all former Wills by me heretofore made either by word or by writing And I do declare this only to be my last Will and Testament and none other.

In the will of above Joseph Bouton, recorded at Fairfield, and bearing date Dec. 20, 1746, he bequeaths portions to his daughters whom he designates as Sarah Hanford and Dinah Benedict, and closes by ordering the remainder of his estate to be equally divided among his four children, naming Jachin and John as his two sons.

In the name of God Amen. December 20, 1746.

I, Joseph Bouton, of Norwalk, county of Fairfield, state of Connecticut, by these presence doe give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Mary Bouton, the whole of my movable estate, to be at her own absolute disposal, except my young riding mare.

To my daughter Sarah Hanford (begotten of my body), and to be hers forever, all my right lying in Bouton's meadows, running east to meadow belonging to my son-inlaw, Dea. John Benedict, and west to meadow belonging to my brother Edmund Waring.

To my daughter Dinah Benedict I will and demise ye whole of my salt meadow lying in Bouton's meadows, so called, bounded by land of Edmund Waring and Richard Everitt, and also my riding mare. To my son-in-law, Dea. John Benedict, in consideration of his taking the whole care of my beloved brother Thomas Bouton to the end of my brother's days, both in sickness and in health.

To my beloved grandson, Joseph Bouton, I bequeath my dwelling house in Norwalk, and one acre of land adjoining, Dinah Benedict, Jachin Bouton and John Bouton and to their heirs forever.

I will that all my estate, not otherwise disposed of, be divided in equal shares between my four children. Joseph Boutton. [seal.]

At a court of probate, held Fairfield, Ct., Nov. 15, 1779, personally appeared Susannah Bouton and William Bouton, executors of the last will of Joseph Bouton, late of Norwalk, deceased, and on oath declared that the foregoing is a true and perfect inventory of the estate of the s deceased that hath come to their knowledge, and that if any thing more should appear belonging to the estate they would cause it to be added and inserted, accounting the Spanish milled dollar at six shillings-117£ 9s. 6d. Order of Court of Probate, held Fairfield, April 16, 1792:

The Court ordered, that one-third of deceased's estate be set off to the widow of Joseph Bouton, of Norwalk, and enough of the estate to pay 77£ 14s. Hid. debts against said deceased Joseph Bouton's estate.

Imprimis: I give and bequeath to my son, John Burge, one shilling Sterling besides what I have formerly given him.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, Richard Burge, the use of fifty acres of land during his life joining the land whereupon he now lives while I have laid off to him already and after his decease I give the said fifty acres of land to William Burge, son of Richard Burge, to hold to him and his heirs forever.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, William Burge, one shilling Sterling beside what I have formerly given him.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, Thomas Burge, one shilling Sterling beside what I have formerly given him.

Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Rains, one shilling Sterling beside what I have formerly given her.

Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter, Mary Parham, one shilling Sterling beside what I have formerly given her.

Item: I give and bequeath to my daughter, Lucy Taylor, one shilling Sterling beside what I have formerly given her.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, James Burge, the Plantation whereon I now live and the land joining the same, beginning at a corner hickory, from thence to a hickory in Bonner's line, thence down Bonner's line to Jones Hole Swamp, only I reserve to my loving wife, Mary Burge, the thirds of the same during her natural life and after her decease, I give the said land and Plantation to my son, James Burge, and his heirs forever. But if my son, James, should die before he comes to the age of twenty-one years old, then I give the said land and Plantation to my son, Alexander and his heirs forever.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, Nathanile Burge, one tract or parcel of land being at the same corner hickory where my son, James Burge begun, running along Bonner's line to my Cart Road, to a corner, thence down a line to a branch of Warwick Swamp, from thence down a line across a level to a branch of Jones Hole Swamp, running down the same to the old line. I give the said land to my said son Nathaniel Burge, and to his heirs forever. But, if my son, Nathaniel should die before he comes to the age of twenty-one years old, then I give the said land to my son, Woodde, and his heirs forever.

Item: I give and bequeath to my son, Frederick Burge, all the remaining part of my land to hold to him and his heirs forever. But, if my son, Frederick Burge, should die before he comes to the age of twenty-one years old, then my desire is that the land given him be equally divided between my two younger sons, Alexander Burge and Woodde Burge, and to hold to them and their heirs forever. All the rest of my estate of Negroes and all other things of what nature and quality whatsoever, my will and desire is that it be equally divided between my loving wife, Mary Burge and my children, hereafter named: Martha Pittillo, Priscilla Burge, James Burge, Nathaniel Burge, Amey Burge, Martha Burge, Frederick Burge, Woodde Burge, Alexander Burge and Sarah Burge.

I do constitute, make and ordain my loving wife, Mary Burge and John Chambliss, executors of this my last will and testament and I do hereby utterly disallow, revoke and disannul all other former testaments confirming this and no other to be my last will and testament.' In witness -

It remains a mystery to family researchers why Thomas did not provide for guardianship for his eight minor children upon his death. Mary and her younger children possibly shared the plantation with James. The two younger sons, Woodde and Alexander did not inherit land and later moved westwardly

His age was stated to be 53 years when he was deposed on January 4, 1674/5. In October of 1675, he was captain of a company of militia who fought against the Indians.

He died intestate. Administration granted to the widow and sons, James and John Gorham in 1675/6. The rights of the minor children were ordered to be guarded. Division of the estate was made to the widow, Desire, and children: James, John, Jabez, Mercye, Lydia, Hannah, and Shubal. Fifty pounds was set aside for the education of Shubel and the bond was signed March 9, 1675.

Have you ever heard of Mamachimins (Ma-Mak-Im-Ins) Island? Bell Island, a part of the City of Norwalk, was once the fishing grounds of the Mahackemo Indians, a docile tribe under the leadership of Winnipak who was friendly to the early settlers in the "Rowerton" area.

In view of the natural beaches and jetting rocks, the chief realized that fishing paradise had been granted to his tribe by the Great Spirit. His family came and settled on the island and supplied the tribe with fish. It in fact became an assembly point in lower Fairfield County for the entire tribe for many years. Some allege that the northern end of the island was their burying ground although it is much more likely that this was on Wilson Point where bones and graves were found.

Although Roger Ludlow purchased the Town of Norwalk from the Indians in 1640, Mamachimins was not acquired until Winnipak transferred the land to Thomas Hanford, probably around 1690

Around 1830, Harmon John Bell – who was considered wealthy at the time – purchased all of the island for \$727.18. When you're wealthy and own the entire island, you get to name it. Hence, Bell Island (no "e" on the end) was born.

Know all men by these presents, that I Winnipank, Indian Sagamour of Norwalk, do freely Give to my beloved friend Thomas Hanford, senior, Minister of Norwalk in yc County of Fairfield, in ye Colony of Connecticut, my Island of Land Lying against Rowerton, containing Twenty acres more or less, with all ye trees, Herbage, and other Appurtenances thereof; which sd Island is bounded on ye East with ye Island called Mamachimins [now called Bell Island], and Chachanenas, and on ye West with the point of Rowerton [now called Rowayton]; I the said Winnipank Do by this my act and Deed, Alienate the sd Island from all claims of English or Indians, and as being my peculiar propriety, never by deed of gift, or sale made over to any, but now by this my deed I do give it freely to my beloved friend Thomas Hanford, senr., to possess, improve, to him and his heirs forever. In confirmation of this my act or deed,

I have set to my hand & seal this second day of December Anno Domini One thousand six Hundred and Ninety.

The mark of Winnipank.

Signed, sealed, and delivered in the presence of John Greggory, Samuel Hanford.

Winnipank Indian, ye subscriber, acknowledged ye above Instrument to be his free act and deed, before me in Norwalk.

#### THE FIRST MINISTER.

In the great Bible of Capt. Hezekiah Betts, who died in 1837, aged 77, I find, among other historical memoranda, entered by his own hand, that Thomas Hanford began to preach to the people of Norwalk about the year 1648. As Capt. Betts was so curious about such matters, and so accurate, I had entertained no doubt that his record was correct, and so published it; but as the people who agreed for the settlement with Mr. Ludlowe, in 1650, engaged to "invite an orthodox and approved minister with all convenient speed," it is clear that Mr. Hanford was not here in 1648. Trumbull is doubtless correct, when he says, p. 299, "the same year [1652] Mr. Thomas Hanford began to preach at Norwalk, and some time after a church was formed in that town, and Mr. Hanford ordained pastor."

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WILLIAM BROWN HANFORD, the author of the following reminiscences of the Levi Hanford branch of the Hanford family -- which he has written for this "Review," only a small part of his manuscript having previously been in print -- early in the present year, 1894, passed his ninetieth birthday in Frankin Village, N.Y., where he has resided since 1860 in retired life. He was born in New Canaan, Conn., May 19, 1804, and removed with his parents and family in 1808 to Walton, N.Y., where he passed more than half of a century on the ancestral farm.

This branch of the Hanford family he can trace back seven generations to an ancestral Hanford, a man of large property and respectability, whose given name is unknown, but who died in England in 1596 or 1597. He married Eglin SeliS, a widow. Her maiden name was Eglin Hatherly. She had by her second marriage one son, the Rev. Thomas Hanford, to whom all the Hanfords of this country can be traced back. He was born in England in 1621, and was early sent to school and college. He was a decided Puritan in principle, and opposed to the tyranny and persecution of the Established Church toward all others. For that reason he could not receive the honors due to his college attainments. Feeling deeply the cruelty and injustice that was inflicted on him, it was not strange that in 1642 he should be found an immigrant to the New England colonies. In 1643 we find him completing his education with the Rev. Charles Chauncy, one of the most learned and popular Puritan divines of that day, and afterward preaching for a time in New Haven, Conn. From there he went into Massachusetts. On May 22, 1650, he was made a free man of the colony. In 1652 he was called to the pastorate of the church of Norwalk, Conn. He preached there for forty consecutive years. He married Hannah Newbury, daughter of Thomas Newbury. She died shortly, leaving no children; and on July 22, 1661, he married Mary Ince, widow of Jonathan Ince, and daughter of Richard Miles. They had a family of ten children, as follows: Theophilus born July 29, 1662, who died unmarried; Mary, November 30, 1663; Hannah, June 28, 1665; Elizabeth, July 9, 1666; Thomas, July 18, 1668 (he was the branch from which the Levi Hanford branch of the Hanford family sprung); Eleazor, September 15, 1670; Elnathan, October 11, 1672; Samuel, April 5, 1674; Eunice, March, 1675; Sarah, May, 1677. The Rev. Thomas Hanford died in Norwalk, in 1693, at the age of seventy-two years, respected and highly esteemed. His wife, Mary Miles Hanford, died September 12, 1730, at the advanced age of one hundred and five years.

In 1692 Thomas Hanford, second son of the Rev. Thomas Hanford, married Hannah Burwell, widow of John Burwell, and daughter of Gershon Lockwood. They had a family of five children: Theophilus, born in 1693; Elnathan; Elizabeth; Catharine; and Mary. The gravestones of Thomas Hanford and his wife were standing at their graves in 1893, in good preservation. Theophilus Hanford, the writer's greatgrandfather, bought land, and built on it about the year 1718 or 1719, the first house built in the part of Norwalk that became New Canaan. Theophilus and his wife Sarah had a family of four sons and two daughters, namely: Dinah, born October 11, 1720; Theophilus, April 26, 1724; Levi, March 4, 1731, died May 21, 1796, aged sixty-five years; Ebenezer, born October 14, 1733; Abigail, January 20, 1738; Simeon, July 7, 1741. Theophilus Hanford, Sr. built a house for his son Theophilus, in the hope that he would marry and settle in domestic life. But he, being of a roving, restless disposition, did not accept his father's offer. The house was afterward given to his second son, Levi, who soon after married Sarah Elizabeth Carter, daughter of Ebenezer Carter, a well-to-do farmer noted for generous hospitality, patriotism, and good living. She was born in 1731, and died in 1776, aged forty-five years. He was a man of good mind, honest and upright in all the vocations of life, standing high in the esteem of all that knew him, but of a quiet, unassuming, domestic turn. They were devout and respected members of the Baptist church. He was a good farmer and the owner of mills.

1st. Rev. THOMAS HANFORD, son of Jeffry and Eglin (Hatherly), was born at Fremington (near Barnstable), Devonshire, England, in 1623. She was sister to the celebrated Timothy Hatherly of Plymouth colony. Mr. Hanford was the first minister at Norwalk, Conn., and continued in charge of the church for forty-one years, until his death in 1693. He married first Hannah Newbury who died without issue, second Mary daughter of Richard Miles and widow of Jonathan Ince the New Haven scholar. They had ten children.

2nd. Capt. SAMUEL HANFORD, born April 5, 1674, married Isabell Haynes and died Feb. 2, 1751. He was a deputy to the General Court, from Norwalk, for thirteen years.

3rd. HAYNES HANFORD, born in 1716, married Elizabeth, daughter of Capt. Joseph Ketcham of Fairfield, and died April 18, 1798.

4th. JOSEPH HANFORD, born 1742, married first Mrs. Abigail Bradley and second Sarah Williams, daughter of Jonas and Sarah (Fleet) of Huntington, L. I. He was a royalist at the time of the Revolution and his estate was confiscated by the General Court in 1791.

5th. Lieut. JOHN W. HANFORD, son of the above by his second wife, was born July 4, 1784, married Polly Pearsall, and died at Irving, N. Y., Jan. 19, 1866. He was a Lieut, in the War of 1812.

His wife, the daughter of Samuel and Rachel (Wakemen) Pearsall, was sixth in descent from Capt. John Underbill the noted Indian fighter and author of "News from America."

Rachel Wakeman, daughter of Gideon who graduated at Yale in 1759 and married Ann Adams, was fifth in descent from Rev. Samuel Wakeman, who married Hannah, daughter of Deputy Governor Stephen Goodyear. Gideon Wakeman was fifth in descent from Joseph Hawley who graduated at Harvard in 1674 and who married Lydia daughter of the brave Capt. Samuel Marshall killed in the Great Swamp Fight, 1675.

6th. SAMUEL P. HANFORD, born at Westport, Aug. 13, 1812, died at Irving, July 2, 1895. Maryett F. Lyon, his wife, daughter of Alfred Child and Lucippa (Wight), was born at Attica, N. Y., March 24, 1817 and died Aug. 13, 1892; she was seventh in descent from William and Sarah (Ruggles) Lyon of Roxbury, Mass. Her grandfathers Ethel Bert' Child Lyon and Capt. Nathan Wight and great grandfather, Col. James Metcalf were Revolutionary soldiers from Mass., and her second cousin, General Nathaniel Lyon, was a distinguished hero in the Civil War.

Prof. Samuel F. B. Morse was her father's second cousin.

John Bouton's Will.

In the name of God Amen. December 25, 1700.

I, John Bouton, Senior, of ye town of Norwalk in county of Fairfield, state.of Connecticut, being by the hand of God upon me weak and infirm of body, but of perfect mind and memory (thanks be given unto God therefor), calling unto mind ye mortality of body, and knowing that it is appointed unto all men once to die—

Do make and ordain this my last will and testament.

Principally and first of all I give and recommend my soul into the hands of God who gave it, and my body I recommend to the earth, after death, to be decently and Christian like buried at the discretion of my friends, nothing doubting but at ye general resurrection I shall receive the same again by the mighty power of God.

And as touching such word by estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me in this life, I give, demise and dispose of the same in following manner and form:

After my just debts and funeral charges are paid and legacye payd and discharged,

Imprimus: I do give unto Mary Bouton, my beloved wife, half my homestead and the whole house and half my barn, that side of my home lot of land at fruitful spring, and also my lot of land at Pine Hill, and to dispose of said parcels as she shall stand in need for her relief, and in case she shall not stand in need for her necessity to sell and dispose of them, then she may dispose of them to my children by her as she shall see cause.

And also I doe give to my said wife two cows and all my movable estate as shall or may remain when all debts and dues are paid, as above said.

Also my will is that what movable estate I had of her at marriage with her shall not be inventoried as my estate, but to remain to all the above mentioned estate I doe give unto her during her natural life.

Item: I doe give to my grandchild, John Bouton, of Danbury, the sum of five shillings.

Item: I doe give unto my son Matthew Bouton, besides what I have already given him as portion, the sum of five shillings.

Item: I doe give to my son Joseph Bouton and to his assigns all my right, title and interest in land lying near Ebenezer Canfield's land over the river in the bounds of Norwalke; also my part in barren Marsh creek, he paying to my daughter Abigail Smith the sum of five pounds.

Item: I doe give to my daughter Rachell Sension, besides what she has had as portion already, the sum of five shillings.

Item: I doe give unto my daughter Abigail Smith the sum of five shillings.

Item: I doe give unto my daughter Hannah Betts the sum of five pounds, to be paid by Joseph Bouton as above said paid my two sons Thomas and Richard Bouton equally between them when they shall obtain to the age of twenty three years.

Item: I doe give unto my son Thomas Bouton and to his assigns my Cove lot; also half my meadow lying on west of ye Cove over the river in the bounds of Norwalk; also one half of my land lying between the parts of Norwalk river near ye staddles, being in quantity eighteen acres and a half of land; also seven acres at Cranberry Plains in ye borders of Norwalk; also five acres of land in ye Indian fields; also half of meadow above Silver Mines, so called.

Item: I doe give unto my daughter Elizabeth Waring, to be paid by my two sons Thomas and Richard Bouton equally between them when they shall attain to the age of twentythree years, the sum of five pounds.

Item: I doe give to my son Richard Bouton and his assigns that lot lying in the field behind Moor, so called, near ye swamp called Bouton's swamp; also half of my meadow on ye west of the Cove; also half my land between ye parts of the Norwalk river, being eighteen acres and a half; also seven acres at Cranberry Plains; also half my meadow above Silver Mines, so called; also half of my swamp and meadow east of Pine Hill lyin in the common field.

Item: I doe give to my daughter Mary Bouton the sum of five pounds, to be paid by my two sons Thomas and Richard Bouton when they shall have attained the age of twenty-three years.

Item: I doe give to my three sons Joseph, Thomas and Richard Bouton my whole right of bogg lying on the Mill brook and all my commonage equally to be divided between them.

Item: The half of my home lot not given to my wife and half of ye barn not given I doe give to my two sons Thomas and Richard Bouton and their assigns equally between them.

I doe give to my two sons Thomas and Richard Bouton twenty acres of land lying on ye east side of Five Mile river equally between them; and furthermore I do make and ordain my beloved wife and my son Joseph Bouton administrators of this my will, and that this is my last will and testament, revoking and making void any and all former wills and settlements that may have been by me made.

In testimony whereof, I, John Bouton, Senior, have set to my hand and seal the day and year above written.

Ye signment.

John Bouton, Senior, did, on the day and date thereof, acknowledge the above within instrument to be his last will

Hie Inventory John Bouton's Estate, who departed this life the next day after the date above written, amounting to 260£ Os. Od.

This may certify ye honored court of probate that ye deceased person, namely, John Bouton, did, before witnesses, some short time before his death, give to his oldest son, John Bouton by name, some particular things which is not placed in ye inventory; given him for his encouragement to bring up his youngest brothers; the valuation of s'1 gift, according to our estimation, the several particulars thereof amounting to the sum of  $6\pounds$  5s.; and also the improvement of meadows and land that shall fall to ye children under age, whilst such time they come of age he to maintain them and defray the charges of the same.

The inventory of ye estate of John Bouton, of Danbury, deceased, being exhibited to the court, is by ye court approved and endorsed to be recorded; and ye court do grant power of administration on ye estate to ye sd John Bouton, son of sd deceased, and Matthew Bouton, of Danbury; they pay and remove all just debts to and from ye sd estate and to return an account of their administration to ye court in Fairfield as soon as convenient or when called for by ye court; and the sd John Bouton and Matthew Bouton do acknowledge themselves jointly and severally bound to ye court in ye recognizance of 150£ for a faithful discharge of their administration according to ye above order of ye court.

John Bouton, of Danbury, who was administrator of his deceased father, John Bouton, of sd Danbury, having made a return of an account of his administration to ye prorogation court, held Fairfield, on the 21st day of November, 1705, and moved for a distribution of his father's estate, the court having computed the amount and by said account the court doe find and there is clear estate one hundred and sixty pounds eleven shillings and five pence—160<£ lis. 5d. —to be divided amongst the children of the deceased Bouton as follows, viz.: The eldest son to have a double portion of the estate, and the rest of the children to have equal and single portions of ye sd estate, there being living six children; and the said John Bouton is allowed six pounds and five shillings, which is deducted with ye use of that part of the estate which shall fall to ye children under age until they come to ye respective ages, for bring up sd youngest children of sd Bouton; and ye court appointed Impro. John's older brother was Arthur and younger brother was Henry

Mrs. Katherine Carver and her family, it is altogether probable, came over in charge of Howland, who was probably a kinsman, both he and Deacon Carver coming from Essex in England,--as they could hardly have been in England with Carver during the time of his exacting work of preparation. He, it is quite certain, was not a passenger on the Speedwell, for Pastor Robinson would hardly have sent him such a letter as that received by him at Southampton, previously mentioned (Bradford's "Historie," Deane's ed. p. 63), if he had been with him at Delfshaven at the "departure," a few days before. Nor if he had handed it to him at Delfshaven, would he have told him in it, "I have written a large letter to the whole company."

Deacon John Carver's place of birth or early life is not known, but he was an Essex County man, and was probably not, until in middle life, a member of Robinson's congregation of "Independents." His age is determined by collateral evidence.

John Howland was possibly of kin to Carver and had been apparently some years in his family. Bradford calls him a "man-servant," but it is evident that "employee" would be the more correct term, and that he was much more than a "servant." It is observable that Howland signed the Compact (by Morton's List) before such men as Hopkins, the Tilleys, Cooke, Rogers, and Priest, which does not indicate much of the "servant" relation. His antecedents are not certainly known, but that he was of the Essex family of the name seems probable. Much effort has been made in recent years to trace his ancestry, but without any considerable result. His age at death (1673) determines his age in 1620. He was older than generally supposed, being born about 1593.

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#### SATURDAY, Sept. 23/Oct. 3

A sharp change. Equinoctial weather, followed by stormy westerly gales; encountered cross winds and continued fierce storms. Ship shrewdly shaken and her upper works made very leaky. One of the main beams in the midships was bowed and cracked. Some fear that the ship could not be able to perform the voyage. The chief of the company perceiving the mariners to fear the sufficiency of the ship (as appeared by their mutterings) they entered into serious consultation with the Master and other officers of the ship, to consider, in time, of the danger, and rather to return than to cast themselves into a desperate and inevitable peril.

There was great distraction and difference of opinion amongst the mariners themselves. Fain would they do what would be done for their wages' sake, being now near half the seas over; on the other hand, they

were loath to hazard their lives too desperately. In examining of all opinions, the Master and others affirmed they knew the ship to be strong and firm under water, and for the buckling bending or bowing of the main beam, there was a great iron scrue the passengers brought out of Holland which would raise the beam into its place. The which being done, the carpenter and Master affirmed that a post put under it, set firm in the loer deck, and otherwise bound, would make it sufficient. As for the decks and upper works, they would caulk them as well as they could; and though with the working of the ship they would not long keep staunch, yet there would otherwise be no great danger if they did not overpress her with sails. So they resolved to proceed.

In sundry of these stormes, the winds were so fierce and the seas so high, as the ship could not bear a knot of sail, but was forced to hull drift under bare poles for divers days together. A succession of strong westerly gales. In one of the heaviest storms, while lying at hull, [hove to D.W.] a lusty young man, one of the passengers, John Howland by name, coming upon some occasion above the gratings latticed covers to the hatches, was with the seel [roll] of the ship thrown into the sea, but caught hold of the topsail halliards, which hung overboard and ran out at length; yet he held his hold, though he was sundry fathoms under water, till he was hauled up by the same rope to the brim of the water, and then with a boathook and other means got into the ship again and his life saved. He was something ill with it.

The equinoctial disturbances over and the strong October gales, the milder, warmer weather of late October followed.

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That she [the Mayflower] was "square-rigged" follows, as noted, from the fact that it was the only rig in use for ships of her class and size, and that she had "topsails" is shown by the fact that the "top-saile halliards" were pitched over board with John Howland, and saved his life. Bradford says: "A lustie yonge man (called John Howland) coming upon some occasion above ye grattings, was with a seele of ye shipe throwne into ye sea: but it pleased God yt he caught hould of ye top-saile halliards which hunge over board & rane out at length yet he held his hould . . . till he was haled up," etc. Howland had evidently just come from below upon the poop-deck (as there would be no "grattings" open in the waist to receive the heavy seas shipped). The ship was clearly experiencing "heavy weather" and a great lurch ("seele") which at the stern, and on the high, swinging, tilting poop-deck would be most severely felt, undoubtedly tossed him over the rail. The topsail halliards were probably trailing alongside and saved him, as they have others under like circumstances.

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WEDNESDAY, Dec. 6/16

At anchor in harbor. Very cold, bad weather. This day died Jasper More, a lad bound to Governor Carver. The second death in the harbor. The third exploring party got away from the ship in the afternoon in the shallop, intent on finding a harbor recommended by the second mate, Robert Coppin, who had visited it. Captain Standish in command, with whom were Governor Carver, Masters Bradford, Winslow, John Tilley and Edward Tilley, Warren and Hopkins, John Howland, Edward Dotey, and two of the colonists' seamen, Alderton and English, and of the ship's company, the mates Clarke and Coppin, the master-gunner and three sailors, eighteen in all. The

shallop was a long time getting clear of the point, having to row, but at last got up her sails and out of the harbor. Sent burying-party ashore with body of little More boy, after services aboard.

John Howland was the son of Henry Howland and was born about 1592/3. He died at Plymouth Colony, Massachusetts, February 23, 1672/3. Plymouth Colony records state:

"The 23th of February Mr. John Howland Senir of the Towne of Plymouth Deceased.Hee lived until hee attained about eighty yeaes in the world.and was the last man that was left of those that Came over in the ship Called the May flower, that lived in Plymouth hee was with honor Intered att the Towne of Plymouth on the 25 of February 1672."

On Burial Hill is a monument to John Howland erected in 1897 with funds raised by Mrs. Joseph Howland. This replaces a stone erected about 1836 by John and Henry Howland of Providence, Rhode Island. The earlier stone was buried under the new one. This earlier stone stated that John Howland's wife was "a daughter of Governor Carver", but after the discovery in 1856 of Governor William Bradford's manuscript Of Plimoth Plantation, it was known that he married Elizabeth Tilley, daughter of John and Joan Tilley who were also passengers of the Mayflower.

John Howland boarded the Mayflower in England in September 1620, arrived in Provincetown Harbor, November 21, 1620 and, although called a man-servant of Governor Carver, he was the thirteenth signer of the Mayflower Compact in Plymouth Harbor on December 21, 1620.

Within a few years he married Elizabeth Tilley, built a house on First Street and gradually as land was allotted to each family, he acquired four acres on Watson's Hill, Plymouth and considerable acreage in Duxbury. February 2, 1638/9 he bought from John Jenny the property called Rocky Nook (Kingston). Some of this land is still owned by our Society.

He served in the General court of Plymouth as Committeeman in 1637, 1639-1652 and as Deputy 1652, 1659, 1661-1668 and 1670.

He had two brothers, Arthur and Henry who arrived a few years later. Arthur Howland married Margaret Reed, settled in Marshfield and had five children. Sir Winston Churchill, an honorary member of the Pilgrim John Howland Society, was one of his descendants. Henry Howland married Mary (Newland) and lived in Duxbury. They had eight children. Both brothers joined the Society of Friends. For many generations the descendants of these two men remained Quakers, many settled around Dartmouth, MA where they became very prosperous.

#### TIMELINE

1620 - John Howland and Elizabeth arrive on the Mayflower.

1632 - They went to Maine.

1638/9 - Bought the Rocky Nook farm.

1670 - Jabez Howland bought the house at Plymouth. John and Elizabeth winter there.

1672/3 - John Howland died in the Plymouth home of his son.

Circa 1675 - The Rocky Nook Farm house burned to the ground. Elizabeth makes her home with Jabez' family.

1680/1 - Jabez sells the Plymouth house. Elizabeth signed the deed and moved to Swansea to live with her daughter, Lydia Brown.

1687 - Elizabeth Tilley Howland died and was buried in the Brown Family plot.

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Mayflower passengers John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley were married in 1623/4. John was about thirty-one and Elizabeth was about sixteen. They spent their entire lives in Plymouth, and between them participated in every aspect of the Pilgrim experience from its beginning in Leiden up to the merger of the Bay and Plymouth colonies. This article is a retrospective summary of their lives and their contribution to Plymouth.

John was born about 1592 to Henry and Margaret Howland of Fenstanton, nine miles northeast of Cambridge, England. Elizabeth Tilley was the youngest of several children born to John and Joan (Hurst) Tilley. She was baptized in 1607 in Henlow, Huntingdonshire, England. John Tilley and his family, and the family of his brother Edward Tilley and wife Ann (Cooper), were members of John Robinson's congregation in Leiden.

John Howland, John and Joan and Elizabeth Tilley, and Edward and Ann Tilley were passengers on the Mayflower. John Howland had at least five siblings. Arthur (d. 1675), his older brother, arrived in Plymouth after 1627 while Henry (d. 1671), his younger brother, arrived as early as 1633. Arthur Howland soon moved to Marshfield where he became a major landholder. Henry Howland was one of the original settlers of Duxbury and was chosen constable in 1635.

At age twenty-eight John Howland was recruited in England by John Carver to join his household and be his assistant in moving the Leiden congregation to America. Also included in Carver's household were a servant-girl Desire Minter (age fifteen), a servant-lad, William Lantham, and several other servants. During a storm in the crossing, John Howland was pitched overboard, but luckily was able to catch hold of a halliard and was hauled back aboard the Mayflower. John was the thirteenth signer of the Compact. While in Cape Cod Harbor, John Howland, John and Edward Tilley and others explored the New England coast for several days and chose Plymouth to begin a settlement.

Elizabeth Tilley's parents and aunt and uncle died in the winter of 1621. John Carver took Elizabeth in as one of his household. After John and Katherine Carver died in the spring of 1621, John Howland became the head of the household containing Elizabeth Tilley, Desire Minter, and William Lantham. The living arrangements for this household are unknown. After John married Elizabeth, he received four acres of land as the head of household in the 1623 Division of Land.

Desire Minter was the daughter of William and Sarah Minter, members of the Leiden congregation. Desire's father died in 1618, and she joined John Carver's family. Her mother remarried in 1622, and her new parents established an endowment that Desire would inherit at the age of twenty-one. After a few years in Plymouth, Desire returned to England to assume her inheritance. John and Elizabeth Howland were very fond of Desire and named their first child Desire in her honor. They had ten children: Desire, John, Hope, Elizabeth, Lydia, Hannah, Joseph, Jabez, Ruth and Isaac.

In 1625 John Howland accompanied Edward Winslow on an expedition of the Kennebec River in Maine to explore trading opportunities with the Indians. In 1626 John was asked to be one of the "Undertakers" to buy out the colony's debt to the "Merchant Adventurers" who had invested in the venture to establish Plymouth Colony.

In the 1627 division of Cattle agreement, John Howland acquired twenty acres for each member of his household. In addition, the colonists were organized in "companies" of thirteen members each. The livestock of the colony was divided equally among the companies. Listed in John's "company" were John and Elizabeth and their two children, John and Priscilla Alden and their two children, and five unattached men.

Isaac Allerton (1586-1658/9) negotiated a patent that granted Plymouth the exclusive right to trade with the Indians and to establish a trading station on the Kennebec River. In 1627 Governor Bradford placed John Howland in charge. In 1628 a trading station was built at Cushnoc (now called Augusta) on the east side of the Kennebec River. A year later, a permanent log-house was built, and Howland, then Assistant Governor, was asked to manage the trading station. For approximately seven years John Howland was in charge of the station. It is not known if Elizabeth and their family of three children lived at the station permanently or for short periods of time. During the time that John operated the station Elizabeth gave birth to three more children, but it is not known whether she gave birth while she was living at the trading station or in Plymouth.

The trading station in Cushnoc was very successful. The Pilgrims traded corn and manufactured goods with the Indians for beaver, otter and other furs. The proceeds of this trade enabled the Undertakers to settle their debts with the Merchant Adventurers. In 1643 a colony in Piscataqua at the mouth of the Kennebec River under the control of London investors attempted to trade with Indians on the Kennebec River. Howland and men from Plymouth told the Piscataqua men under the command of John Hocking to leave since they were trespassing and the patent granted Plymouth exclusive trading rights. The Piscataqua men refused to pull up anchor and leave, and John Hocking shot and killed one of Howland's men. One of Howland's men returned fire and killed John Hocking. A meeting called by the General Courts of Plymouth and Bay Colony established that the Piscataqua men were trespassers and that Hocking's killing was justified. Following this, the two colonies agreed to honor each other's patents and to curtail the activities of settlements poaching on these patents. It was feared that if the issue was not resolved satisfactorily, Parliament might appoint a single governor of all New England, which none of the colonies wanted.

In 1633 John (age forty-one) was admitted a freeman in Plymouth. John and Elizabeth acquired land and in time became major landholders in Plymouth and the surrounding towns. For nearly forty years, John Howland was actively involved in the governance of Plymouth through elected or appointed positions, viz. one of the seven Plymouth Assistant Governors—1632-35, 1638-39; one of the four Plymouth Deputies to the General Court for nearly thirty years—1641, 1645, 1647-56, 1658, 1659, 1661-68, 1670; one of the five selectmen of Plymouth—1665-66; one of the Plymouth Assessors—1641, 1644, 1647-51; committee on fur trading—1659; surveyor of highways—1650.

In 1637 John received forty acres of land, and in 1639 he was given a choice of additional land for himself or his heirs around Yarmouth, Dartmouth and Rehoboth. Part of the land he chose was in Yarmouth, which he gave to his son John and daughters Desire and hope and their respective families. In 1639 John purchased land and a house in Rocky Nook, where he spent the rest of his life. Also living in Rocky Nook were Thomas and Mary (Allerton) Cushman and their family.

Quaker missionaries arrived in Plymouth between 1655 and 1662 and attracted a considerable number of converts. Quakers opposed Puritan authority and religious beliefs and practices. They refused to attend church services, would not recognize ministers and magistrates or fidelity oaths, and would not support the church financially. They criticized Puritan beliefs and practices publicly and in such scathing terms as to anger the General Court. Governor Bradford had died in 1657 and was succeeded by Thomas Prence (1600-73), who would not tolerate Quaker criticism and took unusually strong measures to suppress Quaker activities, through fines, whipping, excommunication and expulsion from the colony. In the Bay Colony punishment was more severe, and included hangings.

Quakers wished to separate themselves from the prevailing religious beliefs and practices, just as the Pilgrims had done some fifty years earlier in England. Thus, the Quakers were to Plymouth what the Separatists were to England, except that now the Pilgrims were on the receiving end. Governor Prence and the General Court punished Plymouth residents who attended Quaker services or gave them support and protection.

The families of John Howland's brothers, Arthur and Henry, were two Plymouth families most identified as practicing Quakers. The families ceased attending Plymouth religious services and allowed their homes for the conduct of Quaker meetings. Arthur, Henry and Henry's son Zoeth were called before the General Court in 1657 and fined for using their homes for Quaker meetings. In 1660 Henry was again fined. In 1659 Arthur Jr.'s freeman status was revoked and in 1684 he was imprisoned in Plymouth. Throughout his life, John Howland remained faithful to Separatist belief and practice, but his compassion for Quakers is not known.

John and Elizabeth were highly respected citizens of Plymouth. In 1657 and again in 1664, serious issues concerning members of John Howland's family came before the Court of Governor's Assistants that resulted in judicial sanctions. John Howland was only a deputy for Plymouth to the General Court, and while he did not have to act on these cases personally, there is not way his standing in Plymouth could avoid being affected.

Governor Prence's actions toward Quakers took an ironic twist that can be appreciated by parents today. In 1657 Arthur Howland Jr., an ardent Quaker, was brought before the court. Thomas Prince's daughter and Arthur Howland Jr., fell in love. The relationship blossomed and matrimony seemed inevitable. However, it was illegal and punishable by court sanction for couples to marry without parental consent. Thomas Prence urged Elizabeth to break off the relationship, but to no avail. He then used powers available to him as Governor. Arthur Howland, Jr., was brought before the General Court

and fined five pounds for "inveigling of Mistris Elizabeth Prence and making motion of marriage to her, and prosecuting the same contrary to her parents likeing, and without theire mind and will...[and] in speciall that hee desist from the use of any meanes to obtaine or retaine her affections as aforesaid." On July 2, 1667 Arthur Howland, Jr., was brought before the General Court again where he "did sollemly and seriously engage before the Court, that he will wholly desist and never apply himself for the future as formerly he hath done, to Mistris Elizabeth Prence in reference unto marriage." Guess what happened! They were married on December 9, 1667 and in time had a daughter and four sons. Thus a reluctant Thomas Prence acquired a Quaker son-in-law, Quaker grandchildren and innumerable Quaker in-laws of Henry Howland.

The second case involving John Howland's family occurred in 1664 when Ruth Howland (b. 1646), his youngest daughter, was the subject of a morals case brought before the Court of Governor's Assistants. Sexual mores, including chastity before marriage, were issues about which were strict codes of conduct. Ruth Howland fell in love with Thomas Cushman, Jr. (1637-1726), the first son of Plymouth's Ruling Elder Thomas Cushman (1607-91), and Mary (Allerton) Cushman (1616-1699), a Mayflower passenger. In 1664/5 Thomas Jr. was fined five ponds by the Court for carnal behavior "before marriage, but after contract." Once again John Howland was Deputy to the General Court for Plymouth and not involved personally in sentencing. Twenty-five years earlier punishment could have been severe, e.g. excommunication, fines, stocks for women and whipping for men. However, in 1664 harsh physical sentencing had been relaxed, and the social meeting of the parties became a factor in sentencing. In 1664 Thomas Jr. and Ruth were married. In addition to John Howland's embarrassment, Thomas Cushman, Jr. squandered the opportunity to be considered to succeed his father as Ruling Elder. In 1694, Thomas' younger brother Isaac was chosen to succeed his father as Ruling Elder. Thomas Jr. and Ruth remained in Plymouth. Ruth died as a young woman sometime after 1672, and Thomas Jr. married Abigail Fuller in 1679.

#### The Jabez Howlad House

Plymouth, MA

John Howland died either in his home at Rocky Nook or at his son Jabez' house on February 23, 1672/3 at the age of eighty. He was buried in an unmarked grave in Burial Hill. In 1897, a headstone was erected on Burial Hill by the Howland Society. Elizabeth Howland spent her declining years and died on December 21, 1687 at the age of eighty in the home of her daughter Lydia Brown, in Swansea. Elizabeth is buried in East Providence, Rhode Island, with a memorial marker.

While not political leaders of Plymouth, John and Elizabeth were pillars of the community and played a major part in the colony's governance and development. They lived through every aspect of the Pilgrim experience beginning in Leiden—the Mayflower, the harsh first winter, the Undertakers, the trading station in Maine, the Quakers, King Philip's War—up to the merger of the Bay and Plymouth colonies. Descendants of John, Henry and Arthur Howland multiplied in number and influence to become one of New England's famous pioneer families.

Rocky Nook is a property owned by the PJHS. Located on a small peninsula of land, Rocky Nook represents the core of the farmstead purchased by John Howland from John Jenny in 1638 and held by three generations of Howlands. Upon John's passing, the property went to his second eldest son, Joseph, who in turn gave it to his son James. James sold the property off in pieces, with the last being sold out of the Howland hands in 1725 (until the PJHS reacquired the land in 1920).

Elizabeth Tilley is said by Goodwin (op. cit. p. 298) and others to have been fourteen years old at her parents' death in 1621, soon after the arrival in New England. She was the child of her father's first wife. She married John Howland before 1624. Historians for many years called her the "daughter of Governor Carver," but the recovery of Bradford's MS. "historie" corrected this, with many other misconceptions, though to some the error had become apparent before. Her will also suggests her age.

The Mayflower brought Edward Tilley with his wife Ann who had lived in Henlow, Bedfordshire, England. Henlow Parish records show a John Tilley, baptized December 19, 1571, married September 20, 1596 to Joan (Hurst) Rogers.

Elizabeth was baptized there August 30, 1607, (In her will written December 17, 1686, Elizabeth Howland says she is seventy-nine years of age which places her birth date about 1607). While she was the youngest of five children she was the only child to accompany them. She was also the only member of her family to survive the first winter. It is believed that Elizabeth then lived in the Carver household. John Carver died in the spring of 1621 and his wife Katherine died that summer. There is no record of the date of marriage between John Howland and Elizabeth Tilley. We know that the Division of Cattle in 1627 they were married with two children, Desire and John. If Desire was born in 1624 or 1625 it seems John and Elizabeth were married in March 1623 when Elizabeth was almost 16. After John's death, Elizabeth lived in Plymouth with her son Jabez. When the house was sold in 1680, she lived with her daughter Lydia (married to James Brown), in Swansea (now a section of East Providence, Rhode Island). She died there on December 21, 1687.

Edward Tilley (sometimes given the prefix of Master) his wife Ann are known to have been of the Leyden company. (Bradford's "Historie," p. 83.) It is doubtful if their "cousins," Henry Sampson and Humility Cooper, were of Leyden. They apparently were English kinsfolk, taken to New England with the Tilleys, very likely joined them at Southampton and hence were not of the SPEEDWELL'S passengers. Humility Cooper returned to England after the death of Tilley and his wife. That Mrs. Tilley's "given name" was Ann is not positively established, but rests on Bradford's evidence.

John Tilley (who is also sometimes called Master) is reputed a brother of Edward, and is known to have been--as also his wife--of the Leyden church (Bradford, Deane's ed. p. 83.) His second wife Bridget Van der Velde, was evidently of Holland blood, and their marriage is recorded in Leyden. Elizabeth Tilley was clearly a daughter by an earlier wife. He is said by Goodwin ("Pilgrim Republic," p. 32) to have been a "silk worker" Leyden, but earlier authority for this

occupation is not found.

Master John Tilley, having twice married, and having a daughter some fourteen years old, must have been over thirty-five years old when he sailed on the Pilgrim ship. His birthplace and antecedents are not known, but he was "of the Leyden congregation."

Mrs. Bridget (Van der Velde) Tilley was just possibly a second wife. Nothing is known concerning her except that she was of Holland, and that she had, apparently, no child.

The actual and comparative youth of the majority of the colonist leaders --the Pilgrim Fathers--is matter of comment, even of surprise, to most students of Pilgrim history, especially in view of what the Leyden congregation had experienced before embarking for America. Only two of the leaders exceeded fifty years of age, and of these Governor Carver died early. Of the principal men only nine could have been over forty, and of these Carver, Chilton, Martin, Mullins, and Priest (more than half died within a few months after landing), leaving Brewster, Warren (who died early), Cooke, and Hopkins--neither of the latter hardly forty--the seniors. One does not readily think of Alden as but twenty-one, Winslow as only twenty-five, Dr. Fuller as about thirty, Bradford as only thirty-one when chosen Governor, Allerton as thirty-two, and Captain Standish as thirty-six. Verily they were "old heads on young shoulders." It is interesting to note that the dominant influence at all times was that of the Leyden contingent.

Of these, all except William Butten, who died upon the voyage, reached Cape Cod in safety, though some of them had become seriously ill from the hardships encountered, and Howland had narrowly escaped drowning. Two were added to the number en voyage,--Oceanus Hopkins, born upon the sea, and Peregrine White, born soon after the arrival in Cape Cod harbor. This made the total of the passenger list 103, before further depletion by death occurred, though several deaths again reduced it before the MAY-FLOWER cast anchor in Plymouth harbor, her final haven on the outward voyage.
